A SOLDIER'S VIEW ON UNION GOVERNMENT

Which Gives the Lie Direct to Those Who Pretend to Believe That the Soldiers Are Opposed to Union Government and Conscription.

The so-called "win the war Laurierites" who are going to win the war by a referendum and by withholding further help from Canada, are trying to make the electors believe that the soldiers at the front are opposed to conscription and to the Union Government.

The Guardian was shown a letter received yesterday from a soldier by a friend in this city. He is a native of King's County and, as will be seen by the extracts given below, is a man of insight, intelligence and patriotism. He was a Liberal and is now ashamed of the fact. He sees only the need of men at the front, and realizes, as every candid Liberal as well as Conservative does, that the only salvation for Canada and for the men at the front is by uniting both political parties and carrying out the selective conscription principle involved in the Military Service Act. The Guardian withholds the names of the writer and the recipient but, if any one doubts the authenticity of the letter, is authorized to produce it at any time, if necessary.

Following are extracts— "Well, since writing you last, I have been on leave and you can bet that I had a jolly good time. Spent five days in Glasgow, but as it rained most of the time I did not go round the surrounding country very much. Was out to Loch Lomond and enjoyed the trip immensely. The scenery in Scotland is very beautiful, much wilder and more mountainous than England. If I ever live to get another leave I intend to go away north to the Hebrides Islands, as I learned from a soldier from there that there are many of my father's relatives out there. My Gaelic will come in all right there. Some of the people that were in the compartment with us must have thought we were Germans

to hear us conversing in Celtic. Hope you received the souvenir I sent you from Glasgow. It was not very much but it will be a souvenir of my trip to the land of the heather.

"It is now very nearly three years since I enlisted. I never thought at that time that the war would still be raging on; anyway I don't regret coming when I did, though I was not with the very first to come. I feel satisfied that I have done my full duty and will continue to do so to the best of my ability till the war, or I, is finished. My chances of surviving the war are much better now as I am not in the trenches and under continuous shell fire, though we get shelled very often going up to the trenches with rations. Just at present we are all very busy as we are on the move to another part of the front, and the men must be fitted with heavier clothing and boots and lots of other accessories. Had a very bad cold for the past two weeks and did not feel much like working, but had to keep on the go all the time. I am feeling fine just at present.

"Do you hear from 'Jimmie' . . . I expect he is still in England, as his battalion has not been broken up, but I don't think they will ever come over if they are not disbanded, unless conscription brings out enough men to keep the divisions that are out here up to fighting strength. I am mighty glad to see conscription enforced in Canada, also to see a Union Government formed. They should have the support of every loyal Canadian. Ever since I had a vote I was a very ardent Liberal, and almost feel ashamed of the fact now. I don't know Jim McIsaac's position on the question, but Hughes showed his hand in the House. So I don't support him, not a bit of it.

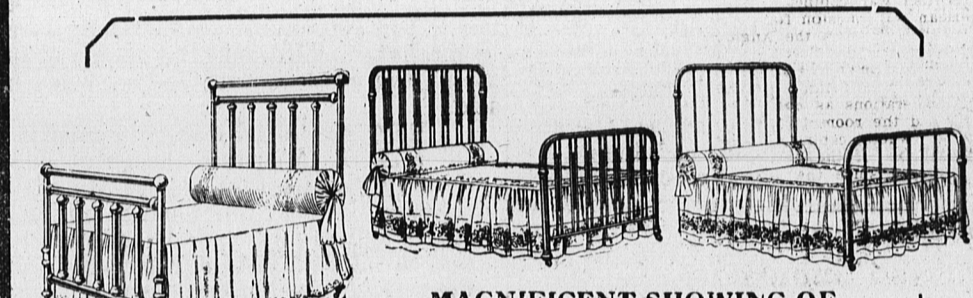
