THE BAPTIST CHURCH

The morning service of the Baptist Church was broadcast by station CHOK. Dr. Vincent in his morning sermon spoke of "A new kind of glory" basing his thought on John, 17: 1. "Father, the hour is come; glorify thy Son, that thy Son may glorify thee."

The blessing of the Palms took place at 10.45. This ceremony was performed by His Excellency Bishop O'Sullivan, who was assisted by Rev. Dr. Murphy, as High Priest.

The large congregation at the evening service heard a very effective and interesting sermon by Dr. Vincent on "Christ's estimate of personality."

ST. JAMES CHURCH

At yesterday's services in St. James Church the Rev. J. M. MacLeod, B.D., occupied the pulpit and preached able sermons, there being good congregations on both occasions.

TRINITY UNITED CHURCH

A series of pre-Easter services were held last week and will be continued each evening this week except Saturday. On Friday night the service will take place in the Church at 8.00 P. M.

At the close of the morning service yesterday, the every person canvas was inaugurated. Pledge cards were distributed and the congregation was addressed by Dr. Houston for the Missionary and Maintenance fund and by Mr. R. H. Rogers on behalf of the local expenses.

The beautiful flowers which adorned the pulpit platform were presented in loving memory of the Mrs. John Bell, West Royalty, the gift of her daughter, Mrs. Johnson. Rev. Mr. Brown preached the morning sermon from the text: Mark 7-9.

In the evening the sermon was by Rev. Dr. Ramsay, whose subject was "Faith and confession," as set forth in the text, "With the heart man believeth unto righteousness and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation."

At both services of the day a special appeal was made for additional funds for the Central Relief Committee and envelopes were circulated, "Blessed is he that considereth the poor, the Lord will deliver him in time of trouble." Psalm 41.1.

ST. DUNSTON'S BASILICA

Yesterday was Palm Sunday the beginning of Holy Week. In St. Dunstan's Basilica at 7.30 Mass was celebrated by His Excellency Bishop

o'clock the Holy Name Men attended Mass and received Holy Communion in a body. At 8 o'clock in the basement, Mass was celebrated by Fr. Lyons for women and children. There was the regular Mass at 9.30.

In the evening the usual devotions were followed by the Lenten sermon by Fr. Lyons, who preached from the text: "Thus passeth the Glory of the world." More transient even than the triumph of Palm Sunday are the temporary successes of Christians.

The office of Tenebrae will be sung on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday evenings at 7.30. On Wednesday evening there will also be a sermon by Rev. Fr. Lyons. The devotions of the Way of the Cross will be held on Good Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock with a sermon by Rev. Fr. Lyons.

The services on Thursday and Friday mornings will be at 9.30 and on Saturday morning at 7.30. Holy Communion will be distributed on Holy Thursday morning at 6.30, 7.30, 8 o'clock and during the 9.30 Mass.

The students and other young people of the city were the guests of St. James Presbyterian Church last evening and their regular co-operative service was conducted there under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. immediately after the evening diet of worship.

A large number were in attendance and thoroughly enjoyed the meeting. Mr. James M. MacFadyen of the Y. M. C. A. religious committee gave a very brief but straight-from-the-shoulder discourse on "Three Ways of Living," and dealt very impressively with this subject.

Two violin solos were rendered by Mr. Jack Wilkins, "Absent," and "A Prayer," by E. E. Starr. Mrs. J. A. Lawson, directed the singing of several of the old favorite hymns and also sang a beautiful solo.

The special choir was made up of various students and young people of the city. Rev. G. Carlyle Webster led in prayer and pronounced the Benediction.

This being the last meeting of this nature until after the Easter holidays, Mr. R. A. Pendleton of the Y. M. C. A., presided and paid fitting tribute to the clergymen of the city who have helped so splendidly in making these services the success which they now are. He also conveyed the thanks of the students and young people to the organist, Mrs. Rogers, and all others who have so heartily joined in the spirit of christian fellowship and have assisted in these services from time to time.

On behalf of the Y. M. C. A. Mr. Pendleton said that there would be no Sacred Song Service next Sunday, and recommended that the students and young people should attend their own respective churches at both morning and evening service, it being Easter Sunday.

The next meeting will likely be held in Central Christian Church on April 23 at half past eight o'clock.

Truro Firm Reports Profit

(Canadian Press) TRURO, N. S., April 9.—Net profit of \$10,874.48 for the year ending December 31, 1932, was reported at the annual meeting of Stanfield's Limited, this figure standing after deduction of all operative and administrative expenses including provision for bad debts and federal taxes.

Stanfield's Limited, manufacturers of underwear, are assured of active plant operations at least until the late spring, President Frank T. Stanfield told shareholders at the firm's annual meeting. He did not wish to express any opinion on prospective business conditions after that. At the present time the chief difficulty was not in selling goods, but in making collections.

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West Australia May Secede From Commonwealth

PERTH, Western Australia, April 9.—(C. P. Cable)—The State of Western Australia today voted to secede from the Commonwealth.

Incomplete returns from the state-wide referendum indicated a majority of those in favor of breaking away from the five other states that comprise the Commonwealth.

Concurrent with the secession vote came the overthrow of the Government of Premier Sir James Mitchell, leader of the United forces of the Nationalist and country parties, with the Laborites holding a clear advantage.

No figures were announced for the secession vote. From the election the party standing tonight was: Labor, 28; Nationalist, 8; Country Party, 9; Doubtful, 5.

Ten days ago during the campaign, William Morris Hughes, Australia's war-time Prime Minister, described the proposed secession as a "crude and futile expedient."

It was maintained during the campaign by Commonwealth leaders that should the referendum produce a vote for secession it could not become legally effective if the Federal Ministry considered it would be inimical to future relations between the Commonwealth and smaller states.
