FOX PELT PRICES.—Judging by the advertisements appearing in American papers there is no falling off in the price of first-class silver fox pelts. The following paragraph from the advertisement of Messrs. B. Altman & Co., of 5th Avenue, New York, one of the largest mercantile houses in the United States, is an indication of the prices in that city, and the value of the fox industry to Prince Edward Island, properly conserved. Under the caption "Rare Silver Fox Skins," the advertisement goes on: "An unusual large and magnificent collection of silver foxes is now assembled in the fur department (third floor). Individual selection are offered at especially low prices, ranging from \$450 to \$3,000 per pair. A number of skins have been made up in mufflers and neckpieces and fashionable sets." 3440

THE BICYCLE RACE.—T. C. Oulton, of Amherst, Nelson Winchester, of Charlottetown, and L. G. Alcorn, of the two-mile race for the Dunlop trophy, at St. John, and this says a St. John exchange, started from the Three Mile House a few minutes after three o'clock on Saturday, about a half a mile east of last five miles and finished the race at the start something west of the gear of Alcorn's wheel and he was obliged to retire from the contest. This Winchester. Each of the visiting wheelmen had two wins on the trophy to become owner. Oulton took the lead at the start and jogged along the road in an easy manner. Not once throughout the entire race did Winchester take the pace but kept a few feet behind Oulton all the way. On the last lap when every person was expecting a fast race an accident happened as the riders were going in to the back stretch of the track. Oulton, who was in the lead, was seen to slow up quickly. Winchester's front wheel collided with Oulton's rear wheel and the Charlottetown man was thrown off. It was only for a few seconds when he remounted and went after Oulton, but by this time Oulton had struck his gait and came under the wire a winner by fully fifty yards. It was an unfortunate accident at the finish of such a long race. Winchester protested the race, stating that it was Oulton's fault that he came back on his wheel and caused a foul. Oulton was very honest in his statement of the accident to the officials. He said that the cause of him setting back on "the wheel" was not intentional but that one of his laces became loosened and caught in the chain and broke. After both the riders gave their versions of the accident the referees and judges held a consultation and decided that Oulton was not to blame, that there was plenty of room on the track for Winchester to keep clear and accordingly awarded the race to Oulton. 3440

FIRE BROKE OUT ON C. P. R. LINER.—LIVERPOOL, Oct. 13.—Fire broke out late last night on board the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Britain, lying in the Mersey outward bound. MRS. HENRY WADMAN

Catherine Wobster relict of the late Henry Wadman of Victoria, was born in Augustine Cove, P. E. I. January 19, 1828, and passed to her eternal rest October 7, 1915. Having almost reached her 88th birthday. For over sixty years she was a consistent member of the Methodist Church, and always took the deepest interest in its welfare. She was a faithful wife, a devoted mother, and a true friend. Wherever there was sickness or sorrow in the neighborhood, she was always at hand with her helpful ministrations, ever kind to the needy and distressed, and forgetful of self, in caring for others. In 1897 she and her husband celebrated their golden wedding, and for seven more years, this devoted couple enjoyed life together. Since her husband's death in 1904, she made her home in various parts of the province, principally with the children of her children. Until about six weeks before her death, she enjoyed unusually good health, and was wonderfully bright and active for her years. She was beloved and respected by all who knew her. During her last illness she sang of "The Immortal City," where saints and angels reign. She leaves to mourn their loss, four daughters, Mrs. D. T. Lowther, North Carleton; Mrs. P. Newsome, Charlottetown; Mrs. I. Lowther, Kensington and two sons, Rev. J. W. Wadman, D.D., Honolulu, for twelve years a missionary to Japan and O. B. Wadman, Craipud, also twenty-three grandchildren, thirty-one great grandchildren, and two great great grandchildren. Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord, etc.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Henry Wadman, held on Saturday, Oct. 9th was largely attended, notwithstanding the very disagreeable state of the weather. Services at North Carleton were conducted by John Rice, Summerside and at Victoria Church, by Rev. G. M. Young, of Truro. Both these gentlemen paid high tribute to the life and character of the departed.

The pall bearers were four grandsons, F. R. Newsome, Leigh Lowther, Harry Lowther, and Lewis Lowther, and two grandsons by marriage, Bert Hogg and Edward Gardiner.

JAPAN TO SURPRISE WORLD

What appears to be an intimation that Japan may co-operate in the campaign to force the Dardanelles is contained in an interview with Baron Hayashi, Japanese Ambassador to Italy, sent to The Petit Parisien by its Rome correspondent.

The third annual meeting of the shareholders of the above company was held in this city yesterday afternoon. There was a good attendance. The following report was submitted by the directors:

"I cannot say much about that, the Baron is quoted as saying in reply to a question regarding the Dardanelles, 'For we must not allow our enemies to profit by information about the movement of troops.'"

The addition of the young foxes will reduce the capitalization of the foxes. Your directors consider it would be injudicious to dispose of any foxes under present conditions.

This report was adopted and after a free discussion the shareholders expressed themselves as pleased with the management of the company and proceeded to elect the following board of directors, viz.: S. W. Crabbe, G. E. Hughes, John Newson, D. A. McKinnon and John Lewis.
