INWARD TRAINS.—The eastern express arrived in Charlottetown yesterday at 11.40 a. m., ten minutes late; the Summerside accommodation at 6.00 p. m., forty minutes late.

MINTO LEAVES.—The Minto left Georgetown Saturday morning for Pictou, with express, 50 tons of freight, 36 passengers and 10 sacks of paper and letter mail and docked in Pictou at 10.35 a. m. She will leave Pictou this morning on return.

SACKVILLE HOCKEY.—In a very keenly contested game of hockey—the first of the inter-collegiate series, played in Sackville, Feb. 5th, Acadia went down to defeat before the Mt. Allison septette by a score of 3-2. Chas. Thompson, Montague, played left wing for Mt. Allison.

FIENDISH ACT.—Several valuable dogs have met their death in Charlottetown at the hands of some miscreant who takes a delight in placing out poisons, thereby killing harmless beasts. Such fiendish acts are but the promptings of the baser qualities of a disreputable and brutal character.

MRS. BELL DEAD.—There passed peacefully away at South Melville, on Feb. 2, 1913, Janet Hefell, beloved wife of Malcolm Bell. She leaves to mourn a sorrowing husband, two children, an aged father, three sisters and two brothers, besides a large circle of friends and relatives to mourn the loss of a kind wife and loving mother. The bereaved have the sympathy of their many friends in their sorrow.

WEDDING BELLS.—A quiet wedding took place at St. Augustine Church, Rustico, on Monday, February third, when James Abraham, Kensington, was united in marriage to Lauretta M. White of Hunter River. Rev. J. J. Chaisson performed the ceremony. The bride, gowned in blue satin, was attended by Miss Margaret Berrigan of North Wiltshire, while Emma Driscoll supported the groom. The happy couple will reside in Kensington.

IMPORTANT DECISION.—The Privy Council has allowed the appeal of the Royal Bank of Canada against the judgment of the Alberta Provincial Court in the case of the Alberta and Great Waterways Railway vs. the Royal Bank. The amount involved is upwards of \$7,000,000 and the appeal was allowed on the ground that the money confiscated by the government was the property of the bond-holders. Hyndman & Hyndman of Edmonton, the solicitors for the A. & U. W. Co., were represented in London by H. H. Hyndman, a nephew of F. W. Hyndman, Charlottetown. The Edmonton Journal in reporting same publishes a photo of Mr. Hyndman.

A LANDMARK GONE.—Hunter River lost one of its aged and most highly respected citizens in the person of James C. Andrews, whose death occurred on Dec. 22nd. He reached the ripe age of 87 years. He was born in Suffolk, England, and emigrated to Canada with his parents John and Mrs. Andrews in the year 1832. They settled at New Glasgow Road, P. E. I., where they took up land and cut a home out of the forest. He surrendered himself to Christ early in life and became identified with the Church of Scotland of which he continued to be a faithful member, and died a triumphant death conscious of going to be with Christ which is far better. At the age of twenty-one he married Mary McDonald, sister of the late Donald McDonald of New Glasgow Road. From this union there was a family of eleven—eight sons and three daughters. In the year 1864 they with their family moved to Hunter River. After 43 years of wedded life death severed this union. He again married Miss Annie McDonald in the year 1892, daughter of the late James McDonald of Stanchell, who still survives, together with four sons and one daughter, also three brothers and one sister and a large circle of relatives and friends who mourn the loss of a kind and loving husband, father and friend. The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. John Sterling and the body was laid to rest in New Glasgow Cemetery to await the resurrection morn.—Com.

D. Johnson, Lieut. Colonel of Charlottetown, is Secy-Treas. The Lorne Valley School, of which Mr. Gordon was the popular and efficient teacher for two years, was awarded one-third of the above second prize for efficiency in physical and military drill.—Mr. Gordon is now in Alberta.

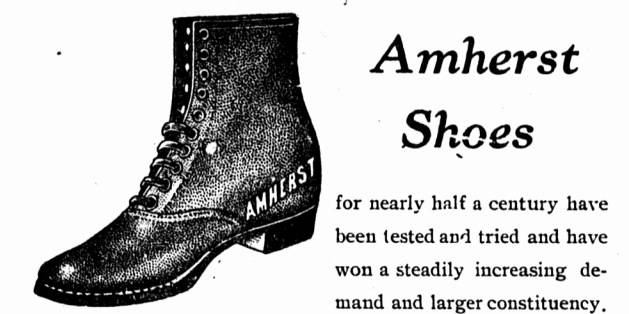
