REASONS IMPRESSIVE FOR INCREASE SCENE AT IN SALARIES JAMBOREE

Brief Presented To Education By Teachers' Federation Yesterday.

The following brief on behalf of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation was submitted by Mr. J. H. Morrissey and other representatives of the Federation at the sitting of the Education Commission yesterday. The brief was as follows:— Our reasons for requesting of the government a substantial increase in salaries may be summarized briefly as follows: 1. The teachers, because of educational requirements, are among the best product of the public schools of the Province. 2. The money expended in acquiring an education, sufficient to qualify them as teachers, cannot be returned to them in savings from the present inadequate salaries paid. 3. A comparison as between the salaries paid to teachers and those paid to men and women in other walks of life in this province shows a maladjustment that is responsible for a deplorably large exodus of the best teachers annually from the profession, thus retarding progress in education and creating in the teaching body a spirit of unrest and dissatisfaction. 4. A comparison as between salaries paid to teachers in this province and in other provinces of Canada discloses an amazing discrepancy that is not justified by the present economic conditions of the people of the province. 5. The salaries paid to teachers in
