NEW EVIDENCE IN REICHSTAG FIRE PROBE

Nazi Press Chief Accuses Bulgarian As Being Companion of Van Der Lubbe in Plot.

(By Louis P. Lochner)

BERLIN, Oct. 29—A new turn in the Reichstag building arson trial had appeared today with the sworn assertion of Major Hans Weberstedt, the Press Chief for Nazi Reichstag members, that he saw Marinus Van Der Lubbe and Wasil Tanef, two of the five defendants, walking through the building on the day of the fire or shortly before.

Van Der Lubbe, a young, solid Dutch brickmason was carrying a wooden box and was followed by Tanef, wearing a ludicrously long overcoat, the witness maintained at Saturday's session.

Suspicious Smell

He also testified that he caught a "suspicious smell" of gasoline from the Communist party's room next to his.

Earlier, Walter Ohme, a newspaper man, testified that Ernst Torgler, former Communist party whip in the Parliament and also one of the men accused of firing the Reichstag last February 27, easily could have fled following rumors that he was connected with the blaze.

Weberstedt's testimony bringing Tanef into the forefront caused another outburst from Georgi Dimitroff, like Tanef and Blagoi Popoff, a Bulgarian political refugee and a defendant.

The impulsive Dimitroff cried, "they have divided the roles among themselves; the different witnesses with different defendants in the trial."

Rebukes Dimitroff

The presiding Judge, Wilhelm Buenger, sharply rebuked Dimitroff, who on several previous occasions has scoffed at court procedure and had been sent from the courtroom.

Tanef, after Weberstedt's charges had been translated for him into Bulgarian, asserted: "The witness is either mistaken or intentionally tells an untruth."

To this sally the Press Chief indignantly replied, "an old German officer never lies."

Tanef, however, persisted. "It is queer that I, who arrived in Germany only on February 24, and know no word of German, should have gone into the Reichstag with that queer fellow Van Der Lubbe."

Acadia Miners Reject Wage Cut

(Canadian Press)

STELLARTON, N. S., Oct. 29.—Contemplated general wage reductions ranging from 21% to 23% percent were rejected Saturday at a mass meeting of Acadia Coal Company's miners. The reductions, sought by receiver-liquidators of the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company, the holding company, were termed necessary to the subsidiary's continued operation.

The proposed reductions, made public for the first time at the meeting, would bring general rates in the Pictou County areas down to the same plane as those paid the Scotia miners in northern Cape Breton. The schedule provides special reductions of 25 percent for brushers and machinists, and 17% percent for contract shooters and loaders.

The annual meeting of the Canadian Baptist Foreign Mission Board was held in Toronto Thursday. The representation, which was unusually large, was: Rev. G. W. Guion, Fredericton, N. B.; Rev. W. H. Warren, Wolfville, N. S.; Rev. W. C. Smalley and Mrs. J. C. Bowen, Edmonton; Rev. Henry Knox, Vancouver; Rev. J. H. Sillmon, Winnipeg; Prof. M. L. Orchard, Dr. John MacNeill, Hamilton; Dr. J. W. Brinn, Windsor; Rev. P. W. Ziemann, London; Rev. J. A. Johnston, W. S. Elliott, P. E. Roberts, Mrs. H. H. Ayer, Montreal; Mrs. Albert Matthews, St. J. Moore, F. Inrig, D. D. McTavish, Rev. Dr. H. T. Bingham, Toronto.

The officers for the ensuing twelve months were elected as follows: Chairman, Rev. Dr. John MacNeill; Vice-Chairman, Rev. Dr. G. C. Warren; F. Inrig and Rev. W. C. Smalley; General Secretary, Rev. H. E. Stillwell; General Treasurer, R. D. Warren.

Tribute was paid to the memory of the late J. N. Shenstone, who had been a member of the board for nearly forty years, and for many years its Chairman. A record year for additions to the churches by baptism in India and Bolivia, 2,399, was reported. The receipts from all sources for the past year were \$201,738. There was a deficit that resulted in the board's action to reduce the estimates for the first time by 12 1/2 percent.

The General Secretary, Dr. H. E. Stillwell, was commended for the arrangement of the annual report. Rev. John McLaurin, home on furlough, was congratulated on his appointment as President of the Baptist Convention of Ontario and Quebec, and the suggestion that Mr. McLaurin should give his service to Brandon College for the term, January to April, 1934, in connection with the theological department was approved.

The board heard addresses from Rev. William Paton, Secretary of the National Christian Council, and also from Rev. Johnson Turnbull, Bolivia; Mrs. Dr. Chute and Rev. John McLaurin, India. The board continued in session today.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. MARGARET MURPHY

Mrs. Margaret Murphy died at Kensington on Sunday, Oct. 22. For some time previous to her demise she was in failing health but was sustained with Christian fortitude. Her family, her medical attendant and her spiritual adviser were in attendance and strengthened this fortitude.

She was the daughter of the late Thomas Dunphy and Ester Barrett, his wife, from whose name Kensington got the appellation Barrett's Cross.

She was a member of a family of seven being the only surviving one.

She was born in the year 1851. In her twentieth year she was married to Edward Joseph Murphy and for fifteen years they lived at Stanley Bridge, where her husband had a shoemaking shop. Thence they removed to Kensington where he still carried on the business of shoemaking. He died in 1906. After his demise Mrs. Murphy maintained the home and provided for the support of the family. Up to three months previous to death, she maintained her natural activity, both physical and mental and died, fully conscious of the sentence of the Just Judge.

Surviving are two sons, Edward Thomas and Frederick and granddaughter, Margaret Stewart and Anne Murphy and grandson, Joseph W. who were all present at time of death.

The deceased members are, Gordon, George W. Harry, Bruce and Laura.

The funeral was held on Tuesday morning from the home to Indian River, the pallbearers being James Jardine, Robert Bowness, W. B. McArthur, James Braham, Owen Larkins and Earl Kennedy. High Mass of Requiem was celebrated by the pastor Rev. Reginald McDonald, the choir chanting the solemn rites.

Buffaloes Acclimatized In Antipodes

OTTAWA, Canada, Oct. 30.—The buffalo which were donated by the National Parks Service of the Canadian Department of the Interior to the South Australian Zoological and Acclimatization Society have had to adapt themselves to a reversal of the seasons. In November, 1929, three buffalo, two cows and one bull, were shipped by the National Parks of Canada from Buffalo National Park, Wainwright, Alberta, to Adelaide, Australia. Precautions were taken for the health of the animals on the journey and after a trip of some ten thousand miles, they arrived at their destination in splendid condition. The animals were given a great reception, but they were not properly robed for the occasion because they arrived January, 1930, one of Australia's hottest months, and were unable at the moment to discard their heavy Canadian winter coats. Within six months, however, they had adapted themselves to the reversed climatic conditions, and in a letter of June 26, 1933, (midwinter), from the Director of the South Australian Zoological Gardens, it is stated that the animals were in their winter coats, were looking very well, and that so far they had reared one calf, which is now about twelve months old, and which promises to grow into a very fine bull.

Six Provinces To Come Under New Death Duties

WINNIPEG, Oct. 28.—Confident they have drafted a death duty law that will survive appeals to the privy council, representatives of British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Ontario and New Brunswick, after meeting with Manitoba government representatives in Winnipeg for several days departed for their respective seats of government today.

Three main points will feature the proposed death duty legislation which the provincial law experts drew up. These points are as follows:

(1) A duty will be levied on all property in the province which passes on the death of the owner regardless of where that owner resides.

(2) A duty will be levied upon every person in the province to whom passes a beneficial interest in personal property situated outside the province upon the death of a person resident in the province who bequeaths such property.

(3) A duty will be levied on every person in the province to whom insurance money is payable under a policy on the life of a person resident in the province where the person receiving the money is an assignee of nominee in the policy.

Canadian Marine Development

MONTREAL, Oct. 29.—Development of Canadian marine activities was outlined here tonight by Hon. Alfred Durand, Dominion Minister of Marine, in an address under the auspices of the Young Men's Canadian Club.

"Navigation still plays a tremendous part in the commerce of the Dominion," he said. "Hundreds of vessels ply to and from Canada's ports and the government has done its part in an endeavor to protect the lives of sailors."

Canada possessed thousands of miles of coastline as well as important inland waterways, the Minister continued.

CANADA'S BITUMINOUS SAND DEPOSITS

OTTAWA, Canada.—Field investigations by the Department of Mines appear to indicate that at least 750 million tons of bituminous sand can be mined by open cut methods in the northern portion of the province of Alberta. On a basis of 12 per cent bitumen content this is equivalent to 80 million tons of bitumen or 450 million barrels.
