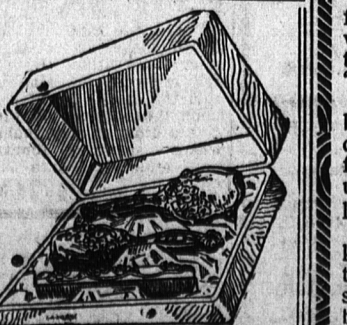

ISLAND LADY DEAD.—The death occurred in Halifax Thursday, Nov. 25th, at 6 p. m., of Mrs. J. S. Nelson, formerly Carrie Saunders of Charlottetown. The late Mrs. Nelson was a sister of Messrs. Charles and John Saunders, Charlottetown, and has a wide circle of friends here who will deeply regret her demise. The funeral takes place from her sister's residence in Truro.

HANDSOME NEW RESIDENCE.—A notable addition to the many architectural triumphs in house building which have made the Brighton district the most attractive residential suburb on the island, is just now receiving the finishing touches from the hands of the various artisans. Mr. W. F. Tidmarsh's new house at the corner of Villa and Ambrose Streets is certainly the best work in chaste design and up-to-date finish in the district. The architects are Messrs. Chapman & Hunter, and Messrs. Schurman of Summerside are the contractors, who have added one more to their many triumphs in the building of fine residences. A circular tower rises at one side to a pinnacle and long ranges of bay windows make this probably the best lighted and sunniest residence in the city suburbs. The upper portion of the walls is finished in black and white stucco panelling, while the lower is of glazed red brick. The roof has been painted in an artistic red. There are eleven rooms altogether, the parlours and dining-room being spacious apartments. The doors and floors on the lower floor are of solid oak, while those above are of birch. Five of the doors are fitted with double action springs. The staircase is handsomely panelled in oak, and when the woodwork has been finished in dark oak polish it will present a handsome appearance. The house is steam heated throughout, and the sanitary finishings in the kitchen, bathroom and lavatory upstairs are of the latest description. There are besides two open fireplaces in enameled brick. The work is delightfully situated and is a distinct addition to the city's list of handsome residences. The above details were furnished courteously by Mr Arsenault, foreman, and Mr James Metzerall.
