A strong plea for the substitution of Christian love for intolerance and party strife, in religious affairs as well as in political and economic matters, was made in St. James Church here last evening by the Rev. D.W. MacDonald, Moderator of the Maritime Synod of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Rev. Mr. MacDonald spoke at the opening session of the Synod before a very large and representative audience.

Taking for his text I Corinthians 16: 13-14, the Moderator emphasized that the words "Let all things be done from love" governed and qualified the other admonitions.

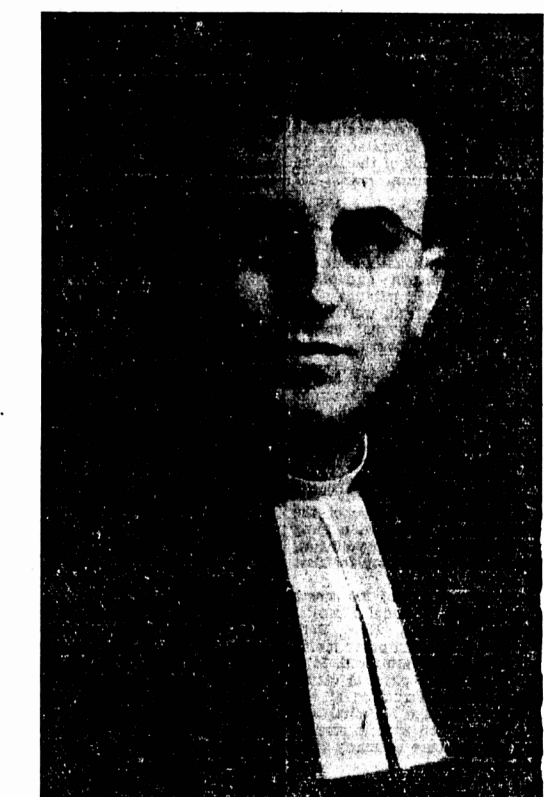
Says Seizure Of Plant Here "Blind"
