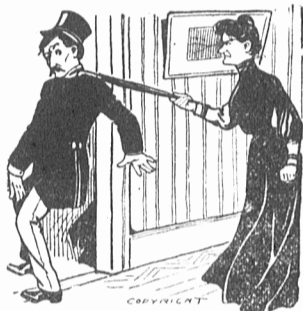

Five Parker's new skates have arrived from the McCullough firm, of Winnipeg, and the speedy North Boder has had a try on the open air rink on the Shamrock grounds on his new blades, and finds them most satisfactory. The new skates are chiefly adapted for out-door work and are unsurpassed for skating on a stretch, as on account of their length the skater may take a very long stroke. On the run the new skates are seventeen inches long and two and a half inches high, with stubbed toe. The boots to which they are attached are reinforced kid, laced to the toe, and the pair with skates attached weigh about 24 ounces. The skates which Parker used last year are short and high, made of aluminum and adapted chiefly for indoor work. They are heavier than the new skates.—S. John Glorie.
