The re-election of Rev. Mr. Maxwell in Burrard, B. C. to represent that district in the Commons is a matter of some general interest. The election was delayed owing to the vast extent of the district, which includes the City of Vancouver and the rough coastline of the Province 400 miles to the northward and 200 miles inland. Rev. Mr. Maxwell is a Presbyterian minister, who was born in Scotland. He came to Canada in 1855, and after filling successive pastoral charges in Quebec went to Vancouver and became pastor of the Presbyterian church there. As the able advocate of civic reform he was elected to the City Council, and did such good work there that the people insisted he should be sent to Parliament. He was elected in 1896 by a majority of 300 which is now nearly or quite doubled. Mr. Maxwell is a staunch Liberal. During his stay in Ottawa in attendance upon the sessions he frequently preaches. It was the writer's privilege to hear him preach and he gave on that occasion an able and impressive sermon. His opponent in the recent contest was Mr. Garden, Mayor of Vancouver.

There is no age limit at which Senators or Judges of our Courts are required to vacate their positions. Yet, at the first blush it seems hardly possible that in extreme old age either the Legislative or judicial faculty can be retained without some impairment. We have however, one Senator now in his ninety-seventh year, who is no doubt as quite capable as many men who are a quarter of a century younger. One of the Judges of the Supreme Court of Canada was born in 1814, the year before the battle of Waterloo. Another Judge of the same Court is 74 years of age, and we have not learned that either of these Judges has become incapacitated mentally or physically. Lord Strathcona is 83 years of age and still a vigorous man. It would be hard in face of such instances to fix an arbitrary age limit for retirement in a country where old age is often so alert and energetic as in Canada.

Victoria, B. C. is very desirous to obtain railway connection with the mainland, which is practicable by bridging from one island to another where they nearly block up the Straits of Georgia in their northern part. Recently a by-law was submitted to the people, proposing to give a bonus of \$15,000 a year for 20 years in aid of a railway northward along the Island coast and across the straits. The vote resulted in a majority of five to one in favor of the bonus. The Colonist tells that many women voted. "All the morning hack loads of ladies drove up to the polling booths where they were received by the agents of the contending factions and shown the way to the stalls." And the ladies voted for the by-law in large majority.

A curious commentary upon the law of landlord and tenant was enacted a few days ago in St. John. A livery stable man who rented his stables from the Diocesan Church Society had fallen into arrears for rent and a seizure was made. Some countrymen had stabled their horses there for the day and these with their wagons and harness were seized by the Sheriff with the other contents of the barn. It is to be presumed that the Church Society will release the countrymen's property, although under the law as it is the property could be sold and applied as part payment of the overdue rent. As in the case of Shylock it is not always just or desirable to take all that the court may award or the law allow.

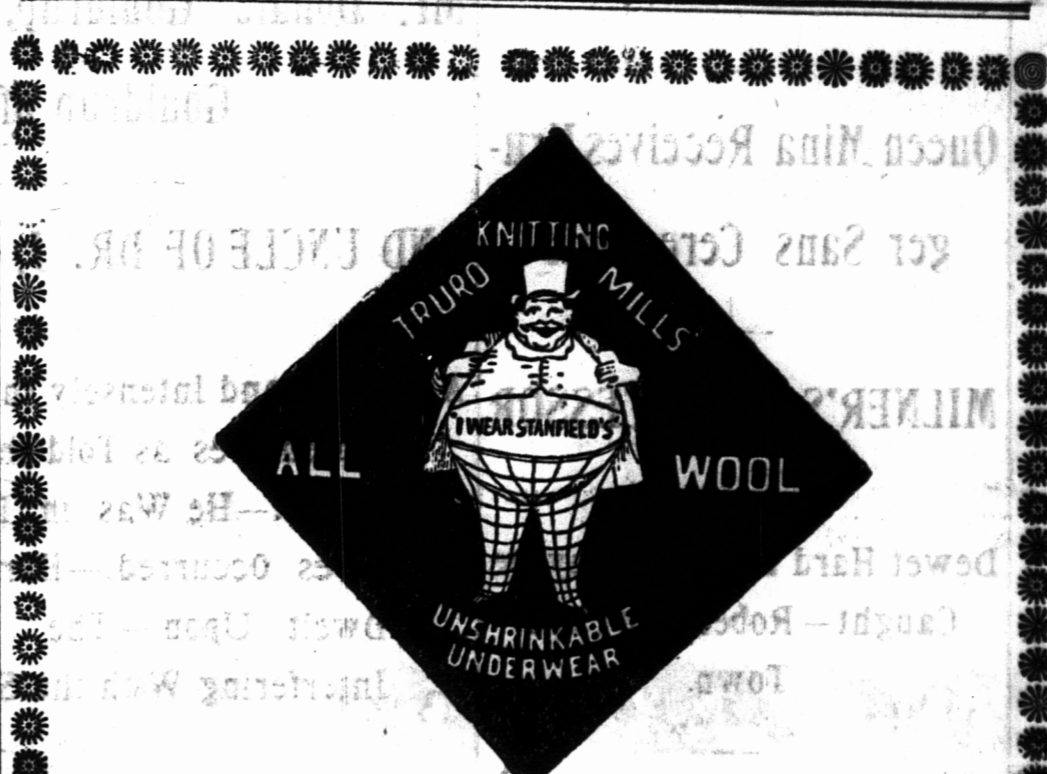
