SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties. Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$20 per acre.

Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-empted land for six months from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$20 per acre.—Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.

The Pioneer garbles and misquotes our statement as to the fisheries question, making utter nonsense of it and then asks, "Will The Guardian dare to tell its readers that this is a correct interpretation of the statements of Fielding, Aylesworth or any one else?" No. We would not dare to state that, because it would be untrue. But what The Guardian actually stated was true and accurate, and is set down in the Revised Statutes of Canada, Chapter 47, entitled An Act to Protect the Customs and Fisheries.

Section 2 of the above cited Act, under the sub-head Licenses, specifies that the Governor-in-Council may from time to time grant to any foreign ship or vessel, "a license to fish for, take, dry or cure, any kind of fish whatever, in British waters, within three marine miles of any of the coasts, bays, creeks or harbors of Canada," &c.

Section 3 specifies that licenses may be issued to United States fishing vessels to enter any Atlantic port of Canada, to purchase bait, ice and other supplies and outfits, and to tranship their catch, or ship crews.

Sections 2 and 3 above summarized are grouped together under the sub-head Licenses, and sub-sections 2 and 3 specify that "the fee for such licenses shall be one dollar and fifty cents per ton register," and that "no license shall be issued for a longer term than one year."

Now lay alongside of these citations. The annexation bugaboo with which certain Opposition journals are endeavoring to frighten the electors into a rejection of reciprocity, is really too silly for serious consideration. If we sell our butter, cheese, eggs, potatoes, oats and what not in the United States—so runs the argument—annexation will follow, Canada will be degraded and the British Empire will be dismembered.

But why shall we sell more dairy products, oats and potatoes in the American market under the reciprocity agreement than we now sell there? Obviously it will be because the American duties will be taken off, and we shall have a free market where now we are met with heavy duties. Who removes the United States duties? The Congress of the United States. It therefore follows that Congress, by removing the duties on our farm and fishery products, has the power to lead Canada into annexation and so to break up the British Empire.

This is the fair and legitimate result of the Opposition argument in regard to annexation. And it is a conclusion so fallacious, so absurd, so dishonoring to Canada and to the intelligence and loyalty of the Canadian people that we are led to wonder that any respectable Canadian journal or public man should put forward an argument which leads inevitably to such a result. We believe that Guardian readers are not only loyal but intelligent and the more loyal because of their intelligence. What do they think of such reasoning?

To their credit, be it said, a number of respectable Conservative journals, usually opposed to the Laurier Government, refuse to accept the fallacious reasoning above referred to, or to be frightened by the annexation bugaboo. Among these are The Victoria Colonist, The Ottawa Citizen, The Ottawa Journal, The Kingston Standard, The Hamilton Herald, The Winnipeg Tribune and many others of lesser note. The Canadian people cannot be frightened by this silly talk of annexation. The statesmen and public men and newspapers who are supporting the reciprocity agreement are certainly not less loyal to King and Flag than the supporters of the National Policy. It was the Toronto Mail, now opposing reciprocity, which as an advocate of high protection laid down the maxim, "If protection is injurious to British connection, so much the worse for British connection!"

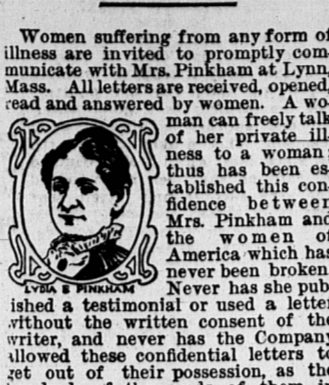
The Pioneer says, "Every school boy in the Province knows that this (fishery) license fee is exacted from United States vessels in return for the privilege of entering Canadian ports, buying ice, bait and other supplies, shipping crews and transferring cargoes; never for the privilege of fishing in Canadian waters." A sad trouble is that some school boys think they know a lot of things that are not so, and it is worse still when one of such school boys becomes the editor of a newspaper.

But few passengers have yet crossed to and from the mainland at the Capes this year, but we cannot tell what day it may become the only route for passengers and mails, perhaps for one, two or more weeks. A reasonable proposition would be in such emergency to take women and aged or invalid men across for one to two dollars and the strap passengers—men who work their passage—for a nominal rate of fifty cents. In both cases a reasonable amount of baggage should be allowed to each passenger free. The route is an inter-provincial one. The service is a Government service. The present charges of \$2 for strap passengers and \$4 each for others with an addition of \$3.60 for baggage which goes free on the railways, is surely unreasonable and extortionate.

A doctor immediately went out and ordered her to the hospital, and Mr. Wright very kindly brought the ambulance out to convey her to the Charlotte-town Hospital, where she got every attention, but very shortly after she was able to be up she ran away from there. The boy at the time she was in the hospital was taken in charge by the Children's Aid Society. She offered him money at different times to get him away from there and would rather have him go round from door to door begging. Early in the winter the boy took measles. The doctor and nurse from the Dispensary went out daily and things were made as comfortable as could be for him, nourishment being taken to him daily till he got better, and Mrs. J. D. Mason had from time to time got coal and money from St. Vincent De Paul Society who have always been very good in giving out things. She has had many things given to her at different times, so she has not been altogether destitute. Ladies from different church societies have given clothes to the boy and mother. ONE INTERESTED.
