Braithwaite & Sparks Battle Tonight Expected To Produce Fireworks

Bill Sparks, of Amherst, Nova Scotia, long regarded as one of the best boxers in the Maritimes, will tackle Cecil Braithwaite, an old foe, at the Sporting Club tonight in a with the winner getting a shot at Irish Leo Kelly, of this city, for the Maritime light heavyweight championship.

The bout was originally scheduled to be between Jerry Duprey and Kelly. Kelly suffered a hand injury in training and Braithwaite was substituted, and then last night it was disclosed that Duprey had been called up for service with the R.C.A.F. on Friday last. Rather than disappoint the sporting fans, promoter MacDonald made arrangements for Sparks to meet Braithwaite and the fight will be staged tonight.

Sparks, never far from top form, will present a tough problem to the clever and popular Braithwaite. Both boys have met on two occasions before, and Sparks' battle should be a dandy from start to finish.

Sparks carries much the heavier artillery in either hand, and an opening occurs, but he will be faced by a superb boxer in Braithwaite, a boy who, although young in years, is aged in experience and ring sense. The fight should be a hard one with almost anything liable to happen. The last time the pair met round scrap with Sparks being returned the winner; so watch Braithwaite attempt to atone for that defeat tonight.

The up and coming Tom McClellan, reigning lightweight champion of the island, meets Jerry Nowlan and with his opponent also reputed to be a crowd pleaser, then this bout also should be crammed full of action.

Two other preliminary bouts will wind up a card that should be tops all the way through.

The first bout will get under way at sharp 9 o'clock.

Detroit Drive For First Place Stopped By Browns; Indians Down Chicago 7-4

NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Johnny Niggeling was right today as he showed up the Detroit pennant drive by allowing the Tigers only four hits while his Browns teammates were lacing out an even dozen safeties for an 8-2 victory at St. Louis.

It was a costly defeat for the second-place Tigers, who not only lost ground to Cleveland but saw their lead over the Yankees dwindle from 2-1-2 games to one.

At Chicago the American League-leading Cleveland Indians hopped on their favorite "cousins," Chicago White Sox for a third straight victory 7-4, combining the veteran Ted Lyons for 12 hits, including five doubles and two triples.

The victory was Cleveland's 15th in 19 games with the Sox. Joe Dobson's brilliant relief pitching and a three-run ninth inning rally was mainly responsible for the defeat of the Sox.

At New York the Yankees nudged within one game of second place in the American League today by sweeping a doubleheader from Washington Senators 3-2 and 3-0.

It was the seventh straight victory and 13th in 14 games for the red champions, who also gained a half game on the first place Cleveland Indians to cut the margin between the clubs to 4-1-2 games.

On Saturday Cleveland Indians, leaders in the American League, defeated Chicago White Sox 5-4 in a 2-inning game after tying the score with four runs in the ninth. Detroit trounced St. Louis 6-1 in another game.

Boston jumped into a six-run lead in the first two frames of a game with Philadelphia and went on to win 10-6 in a hard-hitting contest.

The Yankees registered a 7-1 victory in their game with Washington Senators.

British Defy Air Raids For Football Games

LONDON, Aug. 31.—(CP Cable)—The British sporting public defied air raid threats today to attend the inaugural matches of the second wartime association football season.

Crowds as great as 5,000—small for peacetime but considered good due to war restrictions on attendance—turned out for the 33 matches. After a morning of air raids, the Germans stayed away long enough to let all matches be completed, without interruption, although there was a late kick-off for a couple.

The new season saw the inauguration of a new system for the compilation of standings which will now be based on goal average rather than points.

This is due to the fact that some teams with players who are members of the forces may be unable to keep their schedule if these are unable to get leave or are otherwise called up. Another reason is that transportation difficulties are making it impossible for each time to play all the others during the season.

The result of the new system was high scores in several matches Arsenal's 7-1 victory over Southampton being top. Leslie Compton, a war reserve policeman, was high scorer in this match with five goals.

Rankine took the lead soon after the start to coast home in front of the veteran Harold Weber of the Hamilton Olympic Club and Milt Wallace of the Toronto West End Y.M.C.A. In defending his C.N.E. title, the veteran distance runner from Preston, Ont., was timed in 54:15.7.

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George Young, who gained international fame when he swam the treacherous Catalina Channel in 1927, won the Canadian National Exhibition 15-miles swim at Toronto nine years ago today. It was the only year the Toronto born swimmer finished in the money.

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Boston Bees Sweep Series With Philadelphia Phillies; Dodgers Win Twin Bill

NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—(CP)—Bees scored a twin triumph, 2-1 and 10-0 over Philadelphia Phillies at Boston today to sweep a three-game series and run their current victory string to five straight.

Jim Tobin limited the National League cellar dwellers to six hits in the opener while Manuel Salvo, coasting through the nightcap to his fourth shutout of the season allowed an equal number.

A five-run first inning against the Pearson and Walter Beck ended Phillie hopes of a split in the nightcap.

At Brooklyn the Dodgers conquered their favorite enemies, New York Giants, in both ends of a double header 4-1 and 7-3 to tighten their grasp on second place in the National League.

At Cincinnati a one-run margin in both games of the doubleheader with Chicago gave the Reds their 13th twin triumph of the year as they defeated the Cubs 6-5 and 2-1.

On Saturday Ernie Lombardi came through with a two-bagger and Cincinnati Reds pulled out a

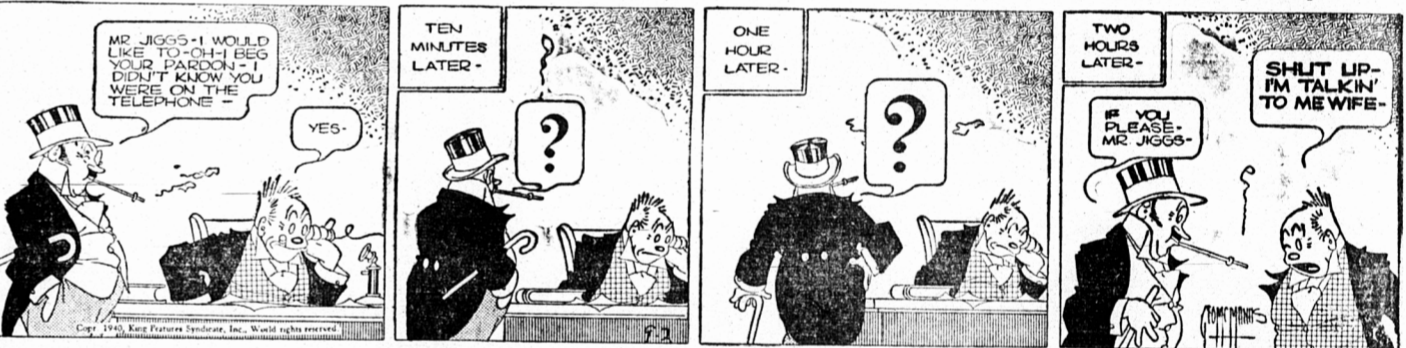
