Oxford Defeats Cambridge

LONDON, Mar. 20.—(C. P.)—Oxford University today has broken a seven year reign of Cambridge University in track and field by winning the 68th annual contest with eight first places to three. Three former United States University men scored five first places for Oxford in the meet which was contested yesterday under a warm sun and on a fast track.

The victory was the 26th for Oxford to 33 for Cambridge. Six meets were tied.

Edwards To Retire

BOSTON, March 19.—(Canadian Press)—Although Phil Edwards, great negro middle-distance star, was beaten in two events, the McGill University track team defeated Boston University 42-1-3 to 34-1-3 points in the first international duel indoor meet held in this section of the track world.

In the meet, held Saturday night the Canadian Olympic veteran was out-run by Arthur Horn of B. U. in the 300-yard trial, raced on a time basis, and later bowed to Dennis Boherty, B. U. Freshman, in the "Y.P.P."

After the second defeat Edwards announced his retirement from track competition.

or six powers, but all nations concerned.

This amplified an official Italian announcement yesterday which spoke of "collaboration of the four powers"—Britain, Italy, France and Germany.

"We are not proceeding with an idea of two or three agreeing and imposing agreement on others," Mr. MacDonald said.

"We are not overlooking the United States by means. We need her, too. The American Government will be kept fully informed concerning the negotiations."

When he arrived here Saturday for his conversations with Premier Mussolini, which were designed to quiet the fears of Europe, the British Prime Minister remarked that the European situation was dangerous. He repeated that assertion today but added that "along with the dangers there also exist great opportunities to do something effective to remove them."

"The proposition we have in mind," he continued, "is to create conditions of real peace which will rise from the satisfaction of various nations who are in position to disturb it. We are out not for an imposed peace but for an agreed peace."

"We have got to save Europe and the world and have got to fit our nationalistic ideas into the whole scheme of which we are a part. We all recognize the tremendous urgency of getting a better atmosphere into the international situation."

Mil Giornale D'Italia, one of the important Italian newspapers, predicted the Mussolini plan would bring about "a new regime in international relations."

The official Italian communique said the plan proposed "collaboration of the four powers in an effort to promote, in the spirit of the Kellogg Pact and the 'no force' declaration, a long period of peace for Europe and the world." The "no force" declaration was signed by the four great powers last December. It approved equality in armaments for Germany and security for France, and it was the instrument that decided Germany to return to the disarmament conference.

SUGAR BOX SAVES LIFE OF BABY BOY

LIVERPOOL, Eng., March 20.—A sugar box saved the life of a baby boy born on the liner Orcma en route from Valparaiso to Liverpool. The child weighed only 3 pounds at birth.

The ship's carpenter made an incubator from an old sugar box. It had a glass top and was kept at constant temperatures from the tropics to Santander, Spain, where the baby was landed.

The child, son of a Bolivian, was named Carlos Orcomilo.

James And Gill Get Counters In Fighting Finish

After Battling Through Two Scoreless Stanzas With Montreal Royals, Moncton Hawk Unleash Third Period Offensive Which Nets Them Two Goals.

Hawks outskated Royals but failed to bring about the Moncton aim, a lead in goals.

FIRST PERIOD

The first rush of the game was made by the elongated St. Germain. On his pass, Neville tested Foster with the opening shot. Royals were given an advantage early, Gill tripping Neville inside the first minute of play. In order to offset this Coach Nicklin sent on the reliable skating wizard "Dud" James, who gave a masterful ragging display. The rival sixes then settled down in a hard skating, back checking game, with Moncton showing a distinct edge. The pace was so hot that player switches were frequent. James' lone and wicked peg almost beat Coulter. The multitude that packed the Stadium resented the long range shooting of the Royals, who despite a neat passing attack, could not fathom the strong Moncton barrier.

When MacQuisten and McManus jostled along the boards and went sprawling together, the former had to seek repose on the team bench.

Pete Kelly drew two minutes with the timers for holding and Moncton pressed.

SECOND PERIOD

Fans were given reason to enthuse shortly after the referee set the teams in motion in the middle canto. Muckie flashed down the right wing, whizzed around the defence and fired a smoking shot that was turned aside only with great difficulty.

The deflected puck went up into the air and barely missed lodging in the high strands of the cage. The Hawks began to pick openings in the front ranks of the Upper Canadians and two and three white-garbed members of the flock broke fast after smart poke-checking. Ill timed passes at the inner fringe of the Montreal blue line, however, spoiled the bids. This was noticeable during the absence of Delahey for tripping. The play slowed temporarily. Fans gave vent to their displeasure when MacQuisten fouled by tripping but went unpunished. This followed a wholesale change of the forward lines, provoked when "Duke" McDonald's shovel shot caught Dave Neville flush in the mouth and he spit blood.

Royals Dangerous

The Montreal thrusts became dangerous and Foster's save of MacQuisten's drive was spectacular. The Royals fought their way into Hawks' home zone time and again. McKenzie, James and Neville followed one another to the pen in quick succession in the turbulent doing. The first named tripped James, who was caught in the act when he cross-checked. For nearly a minute it was four Royals against five Hawks, but the Montreals held strongly.

Gill Misses Nice Chance

Gill missed a golden chance to score when James, spear-head of a three-man raid, centered back neatly with the Moncton wave right in on top of Coulter.

Wilson received the next penalty on the verge of the bell. He gave Muck'e a vicious knee check when the smooth working right wingman was breaking through the strategic right guard point.

While Foster was tested fewer times than his antagonist between the opposite uprights, the second chucker hoists were menacing throughout. MacQuisten and St. Germain were the most feared of the visitors, and gave the blonde goalie some anxious moments.

Coulter fended aside an even dozen hot pucks and found himself in hot water by tardy clearing.

James Scores

Panama Negro Beats Italian

MILAN, Italy, Mar. 20.—(A. P.)—Al Brown, Panama negro, generally recognized as king of the world's bantamweights, easily out-pointed Dominick Bernasconi, Italian titleholder, in a 12-round title match here tonight.

The judges awarded Brown seven rounds, Bernasconi three and called two even. Each weighed 117-1-2 pounds.

Thundering Herd Take Lead
