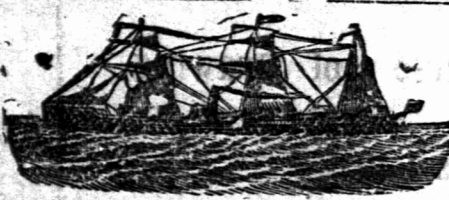

ROYALTY'S LIMITATIONS.

The other day when Generals Corbin
and Young of the American army, who
are attending the German military
manoeuvres, met Emperor William at
Potsdam he spoke of his desire to visit
America, but added regretfully, "I fear
I shall never realise that dream." Here
we have an imperial ruler with great
power over fifty millions of subjects, with
great wealth, too, but who fears he may
never be permitted to take the little
journey across the Atlantic which many
hundreds of thousands of Germans in
very limited circumstances have taken.
The incident suggests one of the many
limitations which are attached to
royalty, not in Germany alone, but in
most other lands as well.

For the sovereign is necessarily limited
and restrained from seeing and doing
many things which the ordinary citizen
may do at will and which constitute a
large share of the citizen's liberty. The
child born to the purple is not as other
children. The royal youth is not free
to choose his associates, his religion
or even his wife for himself, or to travel
where and when he will, for these are all
great and weighty matters of state which
must be determined by wise counsellors.
When he ascends the throne his limita-
tions are increased rather than diminished.
His high office imposes much work to
which he must attend and state duties are
exacting. He is encompassed with cere-
monious observance and his very dignity
is an incumbrance in the way of personal
enjoyment.

It would in many ways be a good thing
if Emperor William could visit the United
States and Canada, to breathe the free air
of a land uncontaminated by tyranny or
conscription, where there are no vast mili-
tary establishments, no orders of nobility,
but where men free and equal have broken
all the world's records in progress. He
would learn much by such a visit that he
can never learn in Berlin or Potsdam,
even if his Hohenzollern pride of power
were to be offended by perpetual lese
majeste. But Kings and Emperors can not
take holiday as other mortals can. If the
holiday were practicable, there are very
few on this continent whom a German
Emperor could visit as his equal in rank,
whom he would recognize as such. His
state visits must be paid chiefly at least to
the rulers and crowned heads of Europe.

Of course it might be possible for the
Kaiser to arrange for the carrying on of
the Government in his absence and
visit America in cogito, but although
possible it would be out of the question.
The rather careless manner in which the
lives of their own Presidents have been
protected in the United States would in-
dicate that crowned heads would not be
entirely safe on a tour in that country,
and it would be impossible to surround a
royal personage with all the military
and police safeguards that he might
count upon at home. In no part of America
including Canada, are the Anarchists and
lawless characters so watched as they
are in Europe. Hence the life of a great

ruler would be vastly less safe in Am-
erica than that of the ordinary traveller,
the latter being entirely secure.

The Shah of Persia or other eastern
potentate may occasionally visit Europe
and Princes of the Blood from England,
Russia or Germany may come to America
from time to time, but it is improbable
that during the present generation any of
the actual rulers of the great nations of
Europe will pay a visit to the United
States, Canada or Mexico.

THE WORLD'S WHEAT CROP.

According to the Hungarian Minister of
Agriculture the world's crop of wheat,
oats, corn and barley will this year run
into billions of bushels of each of the
grains referred to. Two years ago the
great wheat-growing countries in the
order of greatest production were as fol-
lows:

United States bushels	522,290,000
Russia	396,635,000
France	369,383,000
British India	188,582,000
Austria Hungary	177,500,000
Germany	141,130,000
Italy	119,000,000
Spain	105,000,000
Argentina	101,000,000

This year the Hungarian Minister of
Agriculture estimates the total crop for
for all countries as follows:

Wheat	2,905,320,000
Oats	3,004,720,000
Corn	2,973,450,000
Rye	1,570,040,000
Barley	1,141,880,000

The European wheat crop is estimated
to give an increase of 193,120,000 bushels
over the crop of 1901. A decrease of 138,
320,000 bushels is expected in the European
corn crop. The wheat crop of the United
States is estimated at 646,100,000 bushels,
with a surplus of 210,160,000 bushels. The
Canadian wheat crop is estimated at 93,
720,000 bushels, with a surplus of 29,820,
000 bushels.

It will be seen from the above estimate
that in proportion to population the Dom-
inion will rank very high in the list, our
production of wheat being almost 10
bushels per head, against 25 per head in
Argentina; 8 in France, 8 in the United
States, 3 in Russia and about 2 bushels
per head in Germany. Within a few years
it is to be hoped that the normal wheat
crop in Canada will be above 100 million
bushels.

BIGGEST STEEL PLANT.

HOMESTEAD, Pa., Sept. 10.—A swamp at
West Homestead has been filled with hot
slag which has amalgamated into a solid
mass. On this slag will be erected by the
Carnegie Steel Company the largest struc-
tural and angle plant for the manufacture
of steel in the world. An open-hearth
furnace will also be erected to supply the
ingots.
