TRADE BETWEEN CANADA AND THE STATES.

Of all the coal, fish, furs, hides, copper, silver, gold, asbestos, nickel and wood exported by Canada 74 per cent on the average goes to the United States.

both sides at present, but it is to be noted that in case the maximum American tariff were imposed on imports from Canada, it would be held to apply both to goods now dutiable and to free goods, the latter to bear 25 per cent ad valorem.

Our imports from the United States in carriages, cotton manufactures, electric apparatus, paper, provisions iron and steel manufactures was about 80 per cent of all we imported in those lines, iron and steel making up \$26,000,000 out of \$41,000,000 in value.

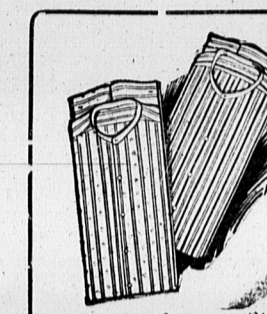

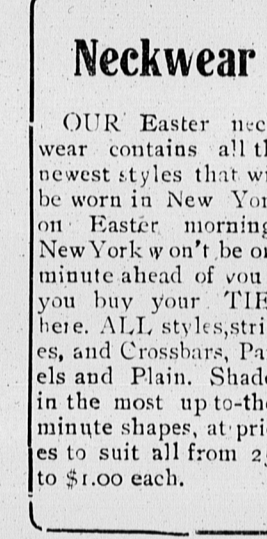
