**THE S. S. SABLE.**—The steamer Sable, Captain Murley, one of the Paragon and company's fleet, is in Halifax to remain a month for general overhauling and fitting out for the seal fishery. She came there direct from St. John's Nfld., between which port and Prince Edward Island the Sable has been trading ever since the opening of navigation last year.

**ISLAND SOLDIER ILL.**—Mr. Robert C. MacNeill, Long Creek, received word Saturday that his son, Gunner Wilnot MacNeill was in Royal Free Hospital, Grays Inn Road, London, England, suffering from acute rheumatism. Gunner MacNeill belonged to the 98th Siege Battery under Major Prowse and had been at the front since last June.

**PRESBYTERY.**—The Presbytery met yesterday forenoon in Zion Church, Rev. W. A. McQuarrie, moderator, pro tem, with whom were present Revs. John Stirling, W. McLeod, M. D. McLeod, John Gillis, D. McLean and Dr. Fullerton; Messrs T. C. James, clerk, and Mr. Ira Shaw, Covehead. A hearty and unanimous call was considered from Brookfield, Hartsville and Hunter River in favor of Rev. A. D. McKenzie, of Montreal, salary \$1200, with use of the manse. Mr. Dan Macdonald, Hartsville, appeared in support of the call, which was sustained and ordered to be forwarded to Montreal, Rev. G. E. Ross to represent the congregation and Rev. Principal Fraser to represent the Presbytery. Another very hearty and unanimous call was received from Kensington and Summerfield in favor of the Rev. T. W. Goodwill. It was accompanied by a guaranteed stipend of \$1200 and free use of manse.

This call was also sustained and placed in the hands of Mr. Goodwill, who it is understood will accept same. The following arrangements were made for Mr. Goodwill's induction in the church in Kensington on Tuesday, February 20, at 2 p. m.:—Rev. J. M. McLeod to preside and induct, Rev. W. McLeod to preach, Rev. Dr. Fullerton to address the minister, and Rev. John Stirling to address the people. Messrs D. N. and A. McKay, from Summerfield, and Messrs J. M. Lalr, George E. Brown and J. T. Profit, Kensington, all appeared in favor of the call to Mr. Goodwill and spoke most enthusiastically regarding its unanimity. A resolution was passed congratulating this congregation on the expedition they showed in securing a settlement, on their fine financial showing in making an advance of \$200 on the former salary and on their unanimity although only recently re-arranged by Presbytery. On the motion of the Rev. Dr. Fullerton, a vote of sympathy was passed to Mr. Ewen Campbell, a member of the court, and his family owing to the serious illness of his daughter and the hope expressed that she might be spared. Presbytery adjourned to meet at Kensington for the induction of Mr. Goodwill on Tuesday, Feb. 20.

**NEW FIRM STARTING.**—Carpenters are busy just now making alterations and improvements to the commodious store on Lower Queen St., lately occupied by the National Clothing Company. This store is to be occupied shortly by the new firm of Turner, Holman, Ltd., merchandise brokers, representing some of the leading manufacturers of Canada and the United States. The members of the firm are Mr. Percy W. Turner, for many years identified with the large business conducted by his father, Mr. H. W. Turner, at O'Leary, and Mr. B. R. Holman, who has conducted a wholesale and brokerage business in Charlottetown the stock of which has been taken over by the new firm, who will conduct a strictly wholesale business.

**YESTERDAY'S MARKET.**—There was a considerably better attendance at the market yesterday morning than for some time, due, no doubt, to the good sleighing, and mild weather. In the market house eggs retailed from 42 to 45 c a dozen, and butter sold at 40 c per pound. Chickens ranged from 50c to \$1.00 each, and fowl at 17c per pound. The meat dealers charged 10 to 12c by the quarter for beef, and from 12 to 18c for it by the small. Live weight ranged from 6 1/2 to 8c. Mutton retailed at 12c lb. The wholesale dealers yesterday were paying prices as follows: Pork, selects, 20c per pound, the highest on record; black oats 70c bushel, and white 68c; potatoes 65c bushel, and hay \$12 per ton.

**CONSTRUCTION BATTALION.**—Mr. Downing, Engineer at Port Borden, it is understood, has been authorized to raise a company of the Construction Battalion of Railway Engineers.

**RECORD PRICE FOR PORK.**—The top-notch price for pork in Charlottetown yesterday was twenty cents per pound, the highest ever paid by the dealers in Prince Edward Island. There was a considerable quantity offering.

**RAIN AND SLUSH.**—The heavy rain which set in yesterday afternoon and continued through the night made the walking throughout the City very disagreeable. Had the sidewalks been properly shovelled this would not have been the case. As it was there was water and slush to quite a depth in many places. The crossings were also blocked last night, the water being a foot or more in depth in places. The city employees will have plenty to keep them busy this morning.

**EXTENDING THE BUSINESS.**—The firm of F. J. Holman & Co. are at present having their place of business at the corner of Kent and Great George Streets extended by a considerable sized addition to the rear. The carpenters are now busy having this work done. Mr. Holman's idea being to open a new retail department in a few weeks' time. There will be entrance to this department on Kent St. and large plate glass windows will give it quite an up-to-date appearance.

**HITCH IN BOAT SERVICE.**—Two boats left Cape Traverse at 11.35 yesterday with five bags of mail, and landed at Tormentine at 4.25. The boatmen on the other side did not cross to the Island side, consequently there was no mail from the mainland yesterday. It is explained by the postal authorities that they have gone back on their former agreement as to terms and conditions. Supt. Grady of the P. E. I. R. is conferring with the men and the indications are that matters will be satisfactorily adjusted and the service soon be running smoothly again. In the meantime the mails have been transferred to the Pictou George-town route.
