CHICAGO, July 9 (AP)—A 36-hole medal play tournament, pitting winners of seven major titles, will be played for the "world professional golf championship" at Tom O'Shanter Club Sept. 7, promoter George S. May announced today.

May, whose \$50,000 all-American tourney, July 22-23, is golf's richest meet, said the 36-hole show-down was approved by the Professional Golfers' Association Tournament Bureau and would carry \$5,000 in prize money, water and take all.

The field will include Lloyd Mangrum, U.S. Open Champion; Sam Snead, British Open Champion; George Fazio, Canadian Open winner; Ben Hogan, Western Open Champion; Herman Keiser, Masters' Champion; and winners of the All-America Open and the P.G.A. Championship at Portland, Aug. 25.

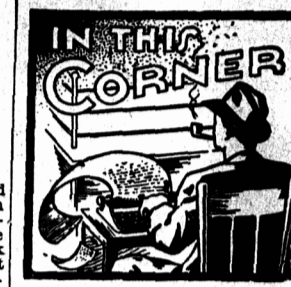

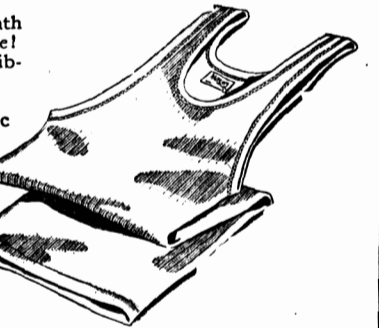

Praise Hitting Of Boston's Ted Williams

BOSTON, July 9 (AP)—After weeks Ted Williams hit two homers for his all-stars, Steve O'Neill who master-minded the American Leaguers to their most one-sided dream-game victory suggested the Red Sox "lend their slugger to every other club for a week."

"That Williams is the greatest hitter of all-time," the jubilant O'Neill said after he had congratulated all his performers. "And Feller never has been much better. He had half of his stuff clicking perfectly."

Boston's "splendid splinter" was still laughing about hitting Rip Sewell's "blopper" for the second of his two four-baggers as he headed for the showers.

"I wish I had a slow motion film of that pitch," he declared. "But I have to thank Bill Dickey for that one. He told me to stop into it."

Sewell admitted he was surprised to have his "sephus" throw belted out of the park. "I've been using it since 1941 and the longest previous hit was a triple by Stan Musial," Sewell declared. "That one was high and windblown too. Don't tell me the American League ball isn't much heavier than ours."

In the National League team's quarters, manager Charlie Grimm echoed O'Neill's praises for Williams and Feller.

"Ted is the best slugger of them all and I think that Feller has more stuff than Walter Johnson. Bob certainly is much harder to hit against," Grimm said. Feller confessed he was hit worried about his hard ball. "I knew I was going to have good control of my slider but I wasn't so sure of my fast ball until I threw it a few times."
