

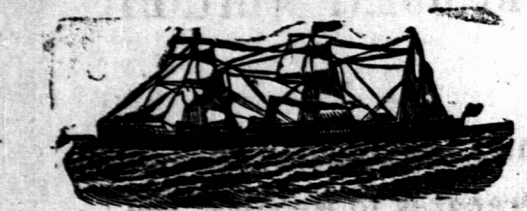

# THE P. E. ISLAND HOSPITAL.

The annual meeting of the P. E. Island Hospital is now again near at hand and before it is held it seems desirable that a public interest should be aroused in order that the meeting may be more generally attended than heretofore by those contributing to its support. We mention this because in years past the annual meetings have been but slimly attended. In view of this fact, and as the Hospital building is located at a considerable distance from the City, we would suggest that the annual meeting be in future held in some hall in the City for the greater convenience of subscribers and contributors from town and country alike.

The annual meeting for last year was first called to be held at the Hospital, and as appears from the published minutes, the attendance was very small, only four of the eight Trustees being present. An adjournment was then made to Kindergarten Hall on a later evening when three additional Trustees and a number of ladies and gentlemen were present. Be it observed that for the non-attendance at the first meeting of the contributors to the support of the Hospital, no blame can possibly attach to the management, as the meeting was duly advertised for two weeks in the three daily newspapers of the City. We doubt not that all connected with the management of the institution are most desirous that as many as possible of those interested in its welfare should come together at the annual meeting.

For the better information of the general public it may be briefly set forth that the governing body of the Hospital is composed of a Board of eight Trustees, chosen in the first instance at a general meeting by ballot of all persons who have contributed to the Hospital funds. Two Trustees, chosen by lot retire yearly, and their places are filled by ballot, the retired Trustees being eligible for re-election. In our judgment the Board might profitably be enlarged to ten or even twelve members, thus giving an opportunity for infusion of new blood without excluding any of those members of the Board whose experience and active interest in the institution renders it desirable that their presence on the governing staff should be retained.

The Medical Board is composed of ten practising physicians and surgeons and two surgeon dentists. A Secretary-Treasurer, Matron, eight nurses, (including probationers) and a Stewardess or Housekeeper make up the working staff. Beyond question the new Hospital building and appliances have greatly increased the extent of the institution's usefulness, but at the same time the annual charge for maintenance has been proportionately enlarged. It has in many ways brought about new conditions which render it desirable that the Board of Trustees should have the benefit of a full conference at the annual meeting with as many of those contributing to the support of the Hospital as can conveniently be got together at the annual meeting.

The P. E. Island Hospital as it stands to-day is a noble institution, invaluable for curative treatment of many of life's physical ills. It is moreover an institution very highly prized and valued by all who through themselves or their friends have had knowledge of its work. It has justly established a claim upon the generous support of humane and charitable persons in all parts of this Island. These facts furnish additional reasons why the relations between its supporters and the
