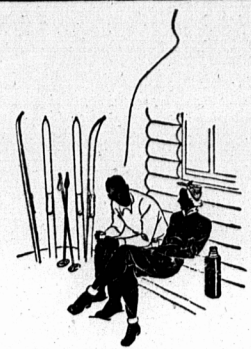

MONTREAL, Feb. 14.—Maritime
hockeyists in the National Hockey
League were ready tonight to con-
cede the "down" eastern scoring
championship to youthful Gordie
Drillon of Montreal, Toronto Maple
Leaf's sophomore ace.
His leadership, threatened for a
time by Bill Cowley of Boston,
Drillon pulled away again last
week and official standings to-
night showed him with 39 points,
more than the former Halifax
Wolverine. No one else stands even
an outside chance of catching the
hustle right winger.
Edie Wiseman of Newcastle, N.
B., second only to Dave (Sweeney)
Schirmer among New York Ameri-
cans' goal getters, remained in
third place behind Cowley with an
even 20 points, 13 of them goals.
Ray Gatliffe, Charlottetown and
Saint John amateur, who return-
ed to action with Boston Bruins
last night after a three weeks ab-
sence, came next with 17.
The remaining Maritimers were
far down the list. Flash Hollett of
Boston taking fifth place with six
points, Bert Connolly, new
Chicago wingman who formerly
played for Moncton Hawks, broke
into the scoring records for the
first time with a goal against Bos-
ton last Tuesday.

Britain And
United States
Win Games

PRAHA, Czechoslovakia, Feb. 14
—(CP Reuters)—Great Britain and
the United States tonight made
certain of advancing into the
semi-final groups of the world's
amateur hockey championships.
Britain defeated Latvia 5-1 while
United States squeezed out a 1-0
victory over Germany. In other
games Switzerland swamped Lith-
uania 15-0 and Poland defeated
Hungary 3-0.
The Canadian team, playing as
Sudbury Wolves, was idle but with
two straight victories and but one
more game to play in the first
round, is certain of being one of
the eight teams that will make up
the semi-final pools.
Great Britain was on the of-
fensive throughout its match. Gerry
Davy of Fort Arthur scored in the
first period on a pass from Jimmy
Chappell, a former Winnipegger.
Davy and Alex Archer, Winnipeg-
trained right-winger, scored in the
second and Chappell and Davy
in the third.
When Latvia netted on Jimmy
Foster in the British net it marked
the first score on him in three
games.
Laurier Charest of Lewiston, Me.,
scored the United States goal in
the first period on a pass from
Arthur Bogue, Detroit. Germany
tried hard for the equalizer but
failed to beat the American goalie,
Jerry Cosby of New York.

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—The New
York State Boxing Commissioners
announced today to have chased an
offer of \$1,000,000 gate right out of

would be conducted at Chicago,
that doubt has been removed by
the Commission's handling of the
big Tony Galento mystery of the
last week.
The promoter Mike Jacobs, of
