Crown Exhibits Examined At Trial

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
 TORONTO, Feb. 6—Defence lawyers at Harry O'Donnell's murder trial were granted access late today to tiny blue hairs picked from his clothes and identified earlier in the day as similar to hairs on Ruth Taylor's ravished body in an East end ravine here three months ago.

Permission for defending counsel to examine the 234 wisps of hair was given by Mr. Justice Nicol Jeffrey, presiding over Assize Court after Dr. J. H. Erb, pathologist, had sworn he could detect "no essential difference" between them and the material in the slain stenographer's blue pullover.

The sweater, another crown exhibit in its case against the accused filling station attendant, also will be examined by defence experts.

Interprovincial Home Does Splendid Work

The tenth annual report of the Interprovincial Home for Young Women, presented to the Board of Governors, meeting in Moncton on February 5th, shows that this institution continues to do valuable work in restoring to normal citizenship many women who were beginning to make shipwreck of their lives. Thirty eight prisoners were in residence during the whole or part of the past year, women, varying in age from sixteen to forty-seven years. During the ten years since the establishment of the Home one hundred and forty women have been committed, 90 from Nova Scotia and 50 from New Brunswick. Many are the letters which the Superintendent, Miss Barbara Walker, has received from women released on expiration of their sentence, thanking her for the change that the Home had made in their lives and for the Christian influences that had brought that change about.

For the last six months, a movement largely initiated by the women themselves and carried on almost in the spirit of the Oxford Groups, has been a characteristic of the religious life of the institution.

In summer the women work on the farm and in the garden. Large quantities of vegetables and fruit are raised much of which is used in the Home, some sold in the open market. In winter the women and girls are busy either in the school or the craft-room.

The superintendent's report shows that by fair calculation the cost of food and maintenance works out to about 78 cents per capita per day for the entire personnel, prisoners and staff which numbers five. This is slightly in excess of the amounts paid by the provincial governments and municipalities. The excess is taken care of by a yearly grant made by the cooperating Protestant Churches.

Rev. G. A. Christie of York was the only representative of Prince Edward Island present at the meeting of the Board of Governors. The institution itself together with farm buildings and land is valued at about \$85,000. It is beautifully situated at Coverdale, not far from Moncton. Although there is still a mortgage of \$7,000 on the building, there is no agent for the Home in the field at the present time. With the gradual awakening everywhere of interest in our penal institutions and treatment of prisoners generally, the value of the work being done by such institutions as this Home for young women will be better appreciated.

Soil Acidity And Fertilizers

(Experimental Farms Note)
 The degree of acidity of the soil may affect to a great extent the results obtained from the application of fertilizers. The plant food elements of a fertilizer may be furnished from various materials and the relative effect of the latter on crop growth will be influenced to a considerable extent by soil acidity. This fact is well demonstrated by the results of an experiment comparing sources of nitrogen on lime and unlimed soil conducted at the Dominion Experimental Station, Kentville, N.S., since 1924.

In the above experiment two sources of nitrogen—nitrate of soda and sulphate of ammonia—were each used to furnish the nitrogen of a complete fertilizer mixture applied to the hoed crop of a three year rotation of mangels, wheat and clover hay. The soil on one range of plots had never received lime and was very strongly acid; that on a second range had previously been limed to such an extent that it was only slightly acid in 1926.

The most marked effect from the lime treatment was evidence in the yield of clover hay. On the soil which had never been limed and which was only slightly acid there was no significant difference in the yields of clover hay resulting from the application of these two sources of nitrogen.

The above results tend to emphasize the importance of the degree of soil acidity when choosing the nitrogenous ingredient of a fertilizer mixture—especially when a crop which is sensitive to soil acidity is to be grown. Sulphate of ammonia is an excellent source of nitrogen for the majority of crops and is widely used for this purpose. On strongly acid soils, however, a dressing of lime (e.g. ground limestone) to lessen acidity would appear to be necessary if best results from the application of this fertilizer are to be obtained.

Sales Volume Steady In Depression Years

MONTREAL, Feb. 6—Volume of goods moved through Canadian department and chain stores in 1935—the worst year of the depression—was between 83 and 90 percent as large as the volume of goods sold through these agencies in 1929, it is reported in the monthly letter of the Royal Bank of Canada for February released here today. The figures are said to constitute a "notable record."

When prices are falling more rapidly than wages the dollar value of retail sales may fall off, but the volume of goods may remain constant or even increase. Thus, the letter continues, in Canada between 1930 and 1931 there was the most severe price decline of the depression but the volume of consumers' goods distributed in 1931 apparently exceeded the amount sold in 1930.

Plan Unemployment Insurance For Farm Workers

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
 LONDON, Feb. 6—(C. P. Cable)—Ernest Brown, British Minister of Labor, moved second reading in the House of Commons today of a bill that will bring 750,000 farm workers within the scope of unemployment insurance. At present British farm workers are not included in unemployment insurance schemes.

The financial provisions of the bill are based on the assumption that about 700,000 men and 50,000 women will be brought under the Act. But it is estimated that only about 60,000 of those will actually be unemployed. The annual cost to the state of the scheme will be about \$500,000.

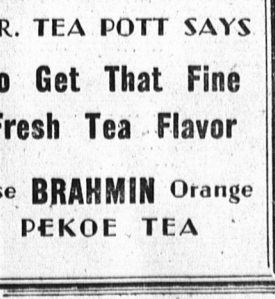

Sealing Skipper Dead in Victoria
