### Confederation

be held in Honour and grateful remembrance.

The Honourable John Hamilton Gray, C. M. G.

Colonel John Hamilton Gray was a native of Prince Edward Island, being born at Charlottetown in the year 1811. His father had emigrated to Virginia and had settled there; but at the conclusion of the revolutionary war withdrew from there and took refuge in Prince Edward Island, where his grandfather had, in consideration of distinguished services to King George the Third, obtained a grant of land.

At an early age, John Hamilton Gray went to England and entered the British Army, serving his King and country as an officer in the Seventh Dragoon Guards, for the full term of twenty-one years. A large part of this extended term was spent in India and in South Africa. His name was honourably mentioned for public services in the field, and he won a medal for special services at the Cape of Good Hope, besides being highly complimented by his official superiors on the prudence and good judgment he displayed as President of a Court of Enquiry organized for the purpose of granting compensation to the sufferers in the border wars.

In 1852 he withdrew from the army as a Captain on half-pay and returned to his native town. During the Crimean War he volunteered to join the staff of his father-in-law, Sir John Pennefather, at Malta, en route to the Crimea, but before he had reached the scene of action Sebastopol had capitulated and the war was over. Subsequently he assisted Sir John as Aide-de-Camp in the formation of a force of English Militia. But soon after he returned to his Island home and entered the political arena.

In 1859 he was elected a member of the House of Assembly, and took a leading part in the discussions of the day. He became leader of the Government in 1863. Edward Palmer, and William Henry Pope, two other "Fathers of Confederation," being members of this administration. The land question was the all important issue at this time.

Hon. John Hamilton Gray was chosen President of the Conference which was convened at Charlottetown in 1864 for the purpose of discussing a Union of the three Maritime Provinces; but which subsequently developed into a Conference on the larger question of the Union of the British Colonies in North America, resulting in the more important Conference held a little later at Quebec. The Honourable Colonel was also a prominent member of this latter Conference.

Colonel Gray was for many years head of the militia force in his native province. He was a strict disciplinarian and punctual almost to a fault. He was three times married, and one daughter, Mrs. Artemas Lord is still living in Charlottetown.

Hon. T. Heath Haviland

Hon. T. Heath Haviland was born at Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, on the 13th day of November 1822. His father was the Hon. Thomas H. Haviland, for many years one of the most prominent politicians and officials on the Island. The subject of this sketch received part of his education in Brussels, and returning to his native land he studied law in the law office of the late Judge Peters, and was admitted to the bar on the 1st of July 1845. In 1846 he was elected a member of the House of Assembly, for Georgetown, which electoral district he continuously represented till 1876. In 1859 he became a member of the Government and sat at the Executive Council Board until 1862, again from 1866 to 1867, and again from September 1870 until April 1872.

While a member of the Executive Council, he held the important office of Colonial Secretary, except that during 1865 he was Solicitor General. In 1862 he was chosen Speaker of the House of Assembly but resigned that office in the following year. He acted as leader of the Opposition from 1887 until the general elections of 1870.

Having been a member of the Quebec Conference, he continued to be a consistent unionist and took a leading part in the discussions which led to the union of Prince Edward Island with the other Provinces of Canada in 1873, and he was one of the three delegates who secured the "Better Terms" Act in April 1873, the Liberal Conservative Party returned to power in this Province.

Mr. Haviland once more entered the Government, in which he held the office of Provincial Secretary until 1876. Dual representation not having then been abolished he was called to the Canadian Senate upon the administration of the province into the Union and continued a Senator until the 14th July, 1879, when he resigned to accept the office of Lieutenant Governor of the Province.

### 110 Mile Walk at 45 Years

LONDON, June 27.—C. Calder, a painter, of Fallowthorpe, Manchester, set up a notable walking achievement recently by walking from Manchester to Blackpool and back, a distance of some 110 miles, in 21 hours 18 minutes.

He left Albert-street Police Station, Manchester, at 9 p. m. on a Friday evening, left Blackpool shortly after 7 a. m. and reached his journey's end at 6.18 on the Saturday night. He finished in splendid style at a good pace and showing no signs of distress. In his own words, "I could have gone much farther."

The direct distance was 103 miles, but Mr. Calder went some seven miles out of his way, being the 104 London-Brighton and back. The longest recognized walk, which is the 104 London-Brighton and back. All the food he had during the walk consisted of raw eggs, bread, and lemon tea. He was tempted with grapefruit, but refused.

Although he walked in his ordinary working boots, there was not a blister on his feet in training by walking to and from his work every day—about 20 miles.

Mr. Haviland was a sound constitutional lawyer, he was for nine years a member of the law firm of Haviland and Brecken, and his reputation as a lawyer was so well established that it was the intention of Sir John McDonald to have made a place for him upon the bench of the Supreme Court, but the death of Sir John McDonald's Government in the Autumn of 1873 prevented the carrying out of this part of his programme.

In his youth Mr. Haviland took an active interest in militia matters and rose in the service step by step, until he was appointed Lieutenant Colonel of Volunteers. He was keenly alive to the importance of education and along with the Hon. Edward Whelan was chiefly instrumental in the establishment of scholarships in Prince of Wales College. Upon the death of Henry Beer, Esquire, in 1886, he was elected Mayor of Charlottetown, which office he continued to hold until 1893. The dairy interests of the Province were also promoted by him, in the most practical way by the importation, and breeding of Jersey Cattle. He is still represented in this City by one son Eustace Haviland, Esquire, Attorney at Law, an esteemed and highly respected citizen.
