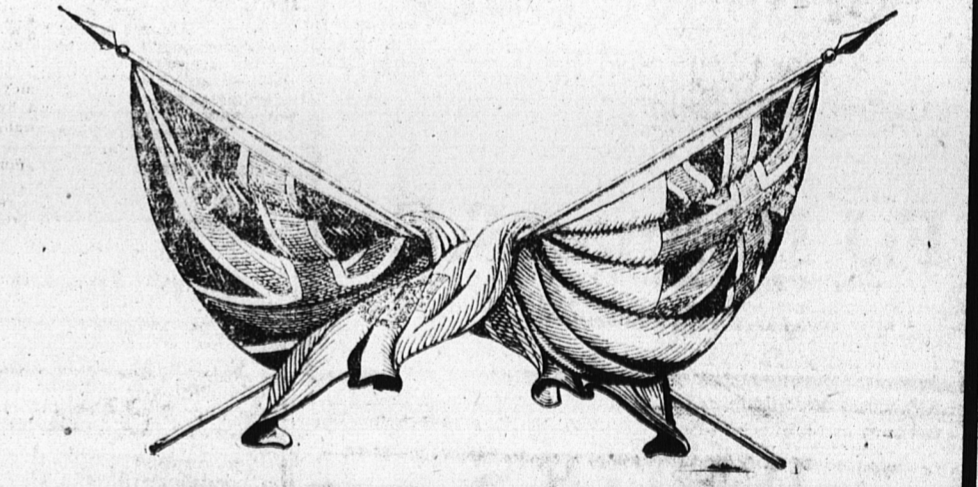
Confessed To Killing Girl
