Urge Consideration To Canada-west Indies Agreement

HALIFAX, Nov. 2 - (CP) - Possibilities of modifying the existing Canada-West Indies trade agreement should be explored and representations made to Ottawa at an early date, the Nova Scotia Economic Council decided today. The Council, and advisory body to the provincial government, in a statement issued after its meeting said it was unlikely there was any possibility of obtaining a revision of the agreement under existing conditions but it was felt that an interim arrangement might be possible that would enable some negotiations to be made between Canada, Cuba and the Dominican Republic.

Premier Dysart Issues Manifesto

FREDERICTON, Nov. 2 - (CP) - Premier Dysart issued a manifesto on Wednesday, Nov. 2, following closely along the lines of a speech he made last night. The manifesto was mainly a review of government accomplishments. Policies of the administration for the future were set forth as including: 1. Co-operation with the dominion government in any essential plans to improve the empire's agricultural position. 2. Further improvement of secondary roads. 3. Continued improvement in the educational system, and guidance for graduates of youth training courses. 4. Further efforts to secure new industries and to aid those engaged in the fishing industry. 5. Continuation of a policy established by 2,000 families have been established in colonization areas. 6. Extension of improvements in the field of public health and social welfare. 7. Completion of a survey of crown lands and organization of a reforestation plan. "The immediate future policy of this government in connection with the agricultural industry will, to a large extent be based on the Empire Taunton, Mass.," said Premier Dysart. "Anticipating that increased food production along certain lines will be necessary it is the purpose of this government to work in close co-operation with the dominion government in any plans considered essential to improve the empire's position. It is also the purpose of this government to consolidate and enlarge policies already in operation, to continue their agricultural program to further develop domestic and foreign markets for farm products and to continue their policy of encouraging co-operative organization." The manifesto reviewed government activities in providing nearly 1,000 miles of paved highways; instituting old age pensions and pensions for the blind; restoring electric school buses; extending public services; aiding industry and forming an advisory council for economic and industrial development; extending basic services; controlling legislation; assisting municipalities and balancing budgets.

Retires After 40 Years in Banking

After 40 years of experience throughout the Dominion and the West Indies, Egin Wetherell, loan inspector of the eastern supervisors department of the Bank of Nova Scotia in Saint John, retired on pension yesterday. A suitably engraved sterling cigarette box was presented to him yesterday by H. L. Enman, eastern supervisor on behalf of the members of his staff. Mr. Wetherell entered the service of the Canadian Bank of Commerce at Strathroy, Ont., as junior clerk in May, 1899. In 1906 he joined the staff of the Metropolitan Bank, Toronto, and served with that institution until its amalgamation with the Bank of Nova Scotia in November, 1914. Early in the following year he was attached to the inspection department until 1928, during which time he inspected the branches of the bank throughout Canada and the West Indies. In January, 1928, he was transferred to the general manager's office in Toronto where he served in the capacity of loan inspector. With the opening of the eastern supervisor's office in Saint John in 1928, he was attached to this office in the same capacity, holding that position until the time of his retirement. Mr. Wetherell left by motor yesterday for Montreal where he will take up residence. He takes with him the best wishes of his friends in the city and throughout the Maritime Provinces.
