Good Showing Is Made By George Walker

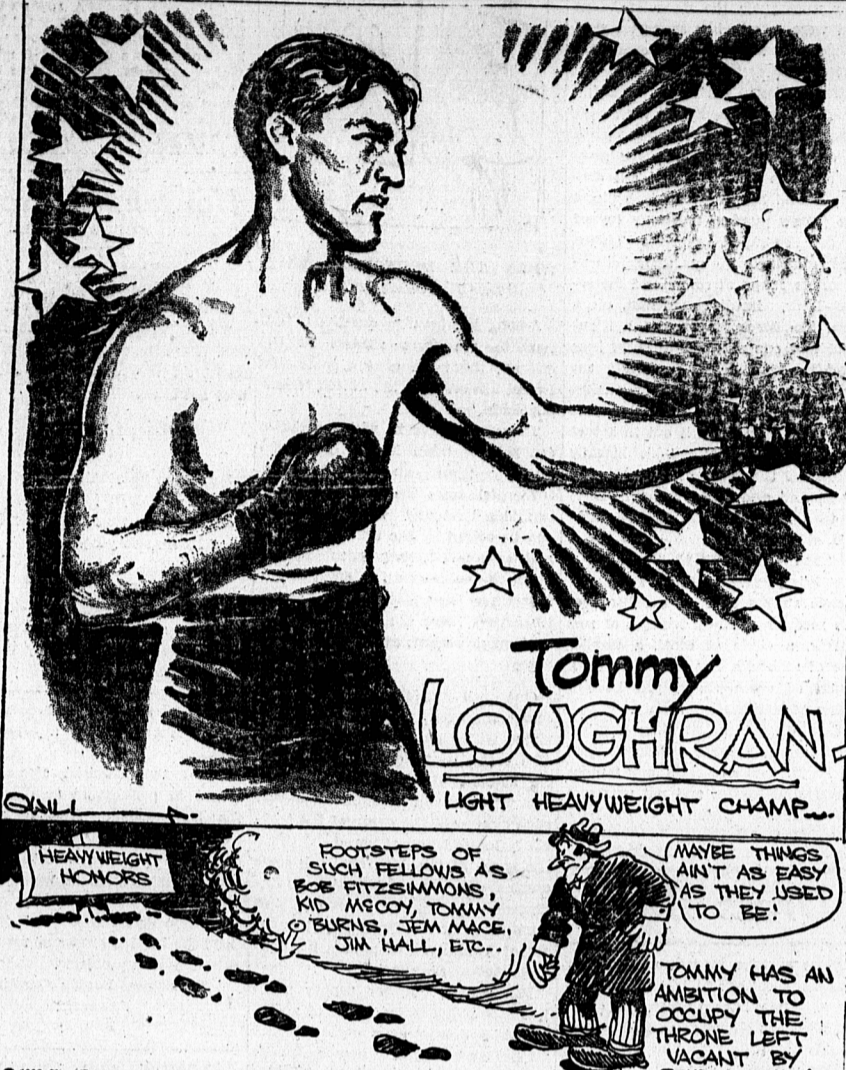

ACE BAILEY LEADS SCORERS IN N. H. L. RACE

Draws Ahead of Stewart Over Week End—Conacher Still King of Bad Men.

MONTREAL, Feb. 6.—The sensational upward thrust of Toronto Maple Leafs over the week end, which swept them into a contending position; the steady progress of the Canadiens, and the victories of the champion Rangers are all reflected in the scoring averages issued last night from the offices of President Frank Calder.

Irvin "Ace" Bailey, scoring right wing of the Maple Leafs, broke the tie for the leadership of the Canadian section as a result of his week end feats, while two of the Rangers' star forwards, Bill Cook and Frank Boucher, are tied for first position in the American section.

Bill Cook has scored more goals than any player in the American section, 12 in all, with six assists. While Boucher has now had seven goals and eleven assists. Carson Cooper, of Detroit, holds second position, while two Boston players, Harry Oliver and "Cooney" Weiland, are tied for third.

The turbulent and hard fought games of the week-end are reflected in substantial additions to the penalty lists. Lionel Conacher, robust captain of the New York Americans, increased the total of minutes he has spent on the penalty bench to 99.

PLANES TO MAKE LESS NOISE IN FUTURE
