WILL VISIT HERE.—A cable from London, England, states that the Rev. R. Mercer-Wilson, M. A., Trinity College, Dublin; Dr. Long, of Limerick, founder of the Medical Mission in that city; Lt.-Col. H. Moore, C.M.G. and T. P. O'Connor will sail for Canada at the end of September as a deputation from the Irish Church Missions to Canada. The special work of the society is to circulate the Holy Scriptures both in Irish and English. Its agents conduct evangelistic tours in the same languages, and it has medical missions and orphanages. They will land in Halifax, where they will speak on the first Sunday in October. They will visit Truro, New Glasgow, Sydney, North Sydney and Charlottetown, going later to St. John. Sir Fabian Ware To Lecture Here On War Graves

Vice-Chairman of Commission on Trans-Canada Tour

Charlottetown is to have a visit from the permanent vice-chairman of the Imperial War Graves Commission, Major General Sir Fabian Ware, K. C. V. O., K. B. E., C. M. G., on Sept. 24, when he will address a public meeting and will show a series of lantern slides depicting the war graves overseas. He is making a trans-continental tour in Canada under the auspices of the Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire with the special object of telling those who lost loved ones in the Great War, that the graves are well cared for.

HIS CAREER. Sir Fabian Ware is a distinguished soldier, writer and student. He was educated at the Universities of London and Paris, receiving the degree of Bacheliers-Sciences in 1894. He has served as examiner for the Civil Service and the Board of Education in England, as acting director of education in the Transvaal and the Orange River Colony, and as member of the Legislative Council of the Transvaal. For six years he was editor of the Morning Post in London. Among the distinctions conferred upon him are the Chevalier of the Legion of Honour, Croix-de-Guerre and a Commander Crown of Belgium. He served in the Great War and was twice mentioned in despatches.

PUBLICATIONS. He has published numerous books, pamphlets and articles on such subjects as "Educational Foundations of Trade and Industry," "The worker and His Country," and has contributed important articles on Imperial questions to the 19th Century Review. He is an ardent believer in the greatness and future of the British Empire
