### SHEEP AND HOGS

"I now come to sheep and hogs. It is true that there has not been a very high price for wool, sheep or lambs this last few years. Yet I feel that we should encourage the keeping of more sheep, as lambs are now realizing a fair price, and a flock of sheep on a farm keeps it freed from weeds and enriches the soil.

### Poultry Raising

"Poultry raising should be encouraged to a greater extent. Our women should be given the profits from the poultry, as I believe they give them more care than the men, and well finished poultry last fall were bringing from 20 to 25 cents per pound.

### FOX FARMING

"I consider that the silver fox industry has been the salvation of this Province in the last few years. In addition to the vast amount of revenue received from this source, the fox industry gives a great deal of employment, and there is a ready market for meat, such as old hares, old cows, and all our inferior young cattle that are not of beef type, which could not profitably be carried over for the winter.

### SEED POTATOES

"I would like to speak for a very brief time on seed potatoes. It is true the farmers made some money in this industry for a time, but has it improved our farms? I consider that our farmers will not now produce much more than half of what they would if our farmers had not gone into the growing of potatoes so extensively. Why? Because they have ceased to a great extent, the hauling of mussels mud, of which we can hardly estimate the value from an agricultural standpoint. They also reduced their stock to a great extent. Still, I consider a small acreage of potatoes profitable, provided we keep a good stock of cattle and hogs whereby we can feed our potatoes when the price is low, as it is this year.

### POTATO GROWERS' ASSN

"The member from Rustico (Mr. LePage) said that this Government should have gone secretly and guaranteed the Potato Growers' Association liabilities at the bank, and kept it under their hats. Now, Mr. Speaker, what a suggestion to come from the "opposite party" on that side of the House!" (Applause.)

### FALCONWOOD FARM

"It is pleasing to note the vast improvements that have been made at Falconwood Farm since this Government came into power, both in the horses and the cattle, which are now all pure-bred, registered stock. When the late Liberal Government was in power, they had some grade cows and some very old cattle that had to be sold for fox feed, at a very low price. The pigs we have there now are also of a very high quality. The sows are practically all entered in the Record of Pedigree tests. Two sows are being used both out of qualified dams, one of them being the champion at the Fall swine show and sale.

that everything in the mess house be dumped over the wharf, and that the place be cleaned and washed before storing any more meat there. Today you will find a first class storage house for meats and provisions, which compares favorably with any up-to-date store-room in Charlottetown. The same applies to the place for keeping milk. Everything is kept under lock and key; everything is checked and accounted for, and a great saving, as well as an improvement from the sanitary standpoint, has been effected in this way.

"We have also a first-class man appointed as Superintendent in the person of Dr. Murchison, and we have retained the services of Dr. MacLaughlin, as assistant. Unfortunately, they have not the proper equipment at Falconwood to obtain the proper results, and there is much need of a convalescent wing for those patients showing evidence of recovery, where they may receive proper treatment.

### FALCONWOOD WRING

Mr. Wood next referred to the dangerous condition of the electric wiring at Falconwood which this Government found when taking over office. He recalled going out there with the late Hon. Leonard MacNeill, Minister of Public Works, and finding many places where the wire was charged by reason of defective installation. He saw wires which had been broken and were just hooked together.

"I spoke of this," Mr. Wood said, "to the Superintendent, and he said that in the Spring of 1931 he notified the Department at Charlottetown, telling them we were living in a fool's paradise. It is true they sent out a man from the firm of Palmer and Watson, and the young man told me himself that they reported back to Charlottetown, and nothing had been done. That was the Superintendent's statement to me. If they had not been careless, Mr. Speaker, I believe the old Falconwood building would be there today." (Applause.)

### Mr. McIntyre Repudiates The overhauling of all the Fal-

conwood wiring was being made by the incoming Conservative Government when the fire took place. Mr. Wood said that when he heard of the fire, it did not greatly surprise him. A few days afterwards, he remembered being out at the scene of the fire, and the "big" member from St. Peter's (Mr. J. P. McIntyre) was there also. "As we stood at the front entrance of the building, the hon. member turned to me and said: 'My, my, I am sorry for you people. The east wing might be repaired by tearing down that corner; but the west wing is beyond repair'."

"I must give the member from Rustico this much credit; he talked about the foundation, but I have never heard him say that the west wing could have been rebuilt. He only went so far as to say that we might have saved the foundation. A great many of the people of Charlottetown drove out there, and saw the ruins for themselves; and I am perfectly satisfied to let the public decide, whether the west wing could have been saved or not." (Applause.)

### Women's Institutes

Mr. Wood warmly commended the work of the Women's Institutes. The great need in rural communities, he said, is for the development of a community spirit. This the Women's Institutes are doing, and they have been the means of effecting great improvements in our schools and in the health and well-being of the pupils. Perhaps the most outstanding monument to their efforts is the Provincial Sanatorium, which is a direct result of their initiative, and which will stand in the future as a memorial to the value and spirit of their organization.

Mr. Wood also strongly commended the work done on the roads. The projects undertaken last summer with federal assistance had given a great deal of employment, and every effort was made to distribute the work fairly and impartially. So far as his district was concerned, he could sincerely say that he had never tried to put a man out of work because he was a Liberal. In conclusion, Mr. Wood referred to the Opposition criticism regarding Prohibition enforcement, and recalled the fight which the Temperance Alliance put up in 1927 to place the Liberals in power. What, he asked, was the result. Did they keep their promise? It is true they got convictions; but they let the offenders run at large. (Applause.)

## SENATOR HUGHES RAPS DIVORCE

### Would Introduce Bill to Prevent Re-marriage of Divorced Persons.

"Divorce was increasing in Canada, the Maritime Senator declared, and many thoughtful persons considered divorce was a "national, social and moral evil" on this continent and was a "frivolous disregard" of the bonds of wedlock.
