In Memoriam

MR. FRANCIS MCKENNA

The many friends of Francis McKenna will regret of his passing, at the home of his son at Albany on July 2nd, 1947. Mr. McKenna had been in failing health for some two years but to the last was quite able, and ever willing, to receive visitors.

His parents were Mr. and Mrs. Frank McKenna of Kelly's Cross, who were married on August 4th, 1863. He was at an age when most people are forgotten; but he was a type one could easily forget. He was ever kind and charitable up to his illness, and his home was open to all who sought its comforts. He moved for a number of years, as mail driver from Charlottetown to Victoria about the turn of the century and the friends he made in route still inquired of him until his death.

His parents were Mr. and Mrs. Felix McKenna of Kelly's Cross. When still a young man he met, and later wedded, Miss Matilda Dunford of South Melville. Mrs. McKenna was a comfort to him until her death on March 9th, 1943. That was the largest cup of sorrow he was ever asked to drink from. Shortly after her death he went to live with his son Lorne at Albany Village a mile from his home for years—Albany Rural, or Upper Albany.

His funeral took place on July 4th, 1947, to Seven Mile Bay Church, where Requiem High Mass was sung by Rev. F. L. Cass, assisted in the sanctuary by Rev. W. V. MacDonald, parish priest of the deceased. Services at the grave were conducted by Rev. Father Cass, after which he was tenderly laid to rest close to the Church of which he had been for many years a parishioner, and, when his health permitted, a faithful attendant. The pall-bearers were Arthur Green, Gratton Noonan, Basil Sherry, Frank McKay, E. V. MacLeod, Simpson Walsh, lifelong friends of the deceased.

He leaves to mourn Dorne and Jerome at Albany; Phil in Winnipeg; Mary Ellen (Mrs. Frank Bergan) of Toronto; Agnes (Mrs. Frank Carey) of Vancouver. Two children, William and Genevieve, also predeceased him.

The many Masses and floral bouquets that he received testify to the esteem in which he was held. To those who so kindly remembered him, the thanks of the members of the family are due.

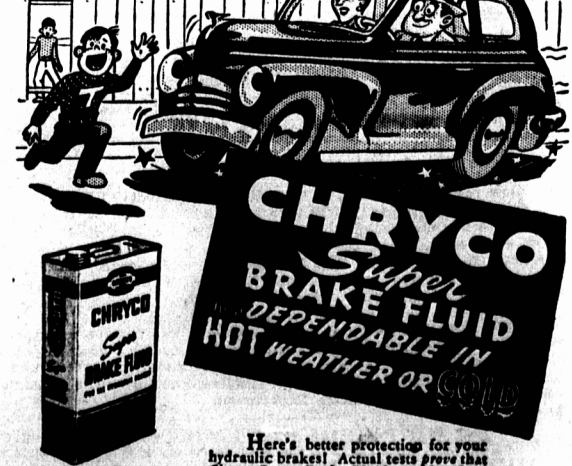
