WALL, England, Dec. 28 (CP) - Plans for construction of attractive, modern post-war homes is a scheme approved in Great Britain. If the government will lend him 20 shillings for factories, Tarran believes that all old-time production methods should be abandoned for his new building methods in which, he says, a house can be knocked up in the blink of an eye.

Whitlock Case

Continues - Before  
Magistrate Tweedy

Further evidence in the case of Earl Whitlock, proprietor of the Orchid restaurant, Great George Street, charged with arson, was heard before Magistrate Tweedy at 9 o'clock yesterday. The witnesses examined being Menton Whitlock, brother of the accused and one of the original partners in the restaurant; Frankman J. T. Robinson, M. W. Reardon, sanitary officer; Leonard Doucette, head waiter; Fred Macdonald and Erna Reaman, also employed at the restaurant; and the accused.

The latest witness to be called was the principal witness, Earl Whitlock, who stated that originally there was a partnership of five in control of the Orchid, of which he was one. Two of them retired and in February, 1943, witness became the sole owner. He assumed all liabilities and was not a partner in the restaurant, and the accused.

He had no insurance on Dec. 11, when the fire took place, witness stated. He said that several small fires had occurred there and for purposes of spraying, witness would account for the surplus grease found at the head of the stairs. The large cauldron in which grease is contained could also have been upset causing the grease to appear on the stairs. He said he had been possible for cats and dogs to enter through the broken windows the year. He also said the fire might have occurred due to a discarded cigarette butt in the basement as the dressing room is situated there. Witness stated emphatically that in any case the fire was absolutely accidental, so far as he was concerned.

Mr. Gordon Holmes appeared for the prosecution yesterday, and Mr. R. R. Bell for the accused.

Reds Within 48 Miles Of Polish Border

LONDON, Dec. 29 (AP) - The Red Army has surged to within 48 miles of the Polish border west of Kiev in a spectacular breakthrough along a 110-mile arc, continuing its offensive across flat steppeland beyond the German, few natural defenses short of the Bug river, 200 miles away.

The Soviet power drive took 250 communities in 24 hours including the major rail hub and fortress town of Korosten as powerful German defenses were suddenly shattered. Moscow announced tonight.

Capture of the town of Vygod, 12 miles beyond Korosten, and Ushumil in between, on the railway line southwestward to Novograd volinsk placed the Russians well on the Zhitomir-Korosten highwater mark of their earlier offensive toward Poland.
