THE NEWEST IN DRESS.

The flare veil has made its appearance, and one now sees fashionables in flare veils, flare coats and flare skirts making a one, two, three tier effect that diminishes gradually in width until the top and narrowest width, the veil flare, is reached.

Dull jet is being used for mourning bonnets, even upon those close bonnets to which are attached long veils. Upon the ultra-smart mourning millinery are also found strings of black pearls, or at least excellent imitations, and the wearer should don black pearl earrings to match.

Black paradise feathers have appeared on the under side of new broad brimmed velvet sailors. These sailors are worn, of course, with an upward tilt which displays both one side of the hair and the spidery plume to advantage.

Grenadier straps, doubtless produced by the military atmosphere just now pervading the world, are appearing upon smart blouses. These straps are of black velvet or of a soft satin or charmeuse to match the material used in the blouse. Lace blouses are strapped with either velvet or silk.

A lovely afternoon street frock that recently emerged from the "studio" of a well known designer, has long, loose biblical lines that fall straight from the shoulder to an inch below the shoulders, and are held in loosely by a wide belt. The close cut loose lines of the back are obtained by scarcely discernable box pleats.

Boudoir caps are now being tied under the chin with black velvet ribbons. Other chic lounging caps are appearing with velvet looped at the back and hanging in streamers to the waist line. Indeed, there seems to be an increasing fondness for black velvet ribbons on negligees in general as well as upon caps and upon certain types of after-noon blouses.

The new half and half stockings is odd and decidedly striking. The upper part of this stocking is usually in direct contrast to the lower part, and when the upper half is of flesh color the lower half of the stocking resembles a man's short sock. These same half and half stockings can be obtained in checks of two colors. The size of the check is at least a half inch, and sometimes more.

The jabot, so well liked a few seasons ago, is again returning, and one finds jabot effects made in one with the crepe de chine blouse, as well as appearing in detachable neckwear. A new organic collar is pleated and edged with bias bands of the same material instead of conventionally finished with a hem or the later fashion of picotage.

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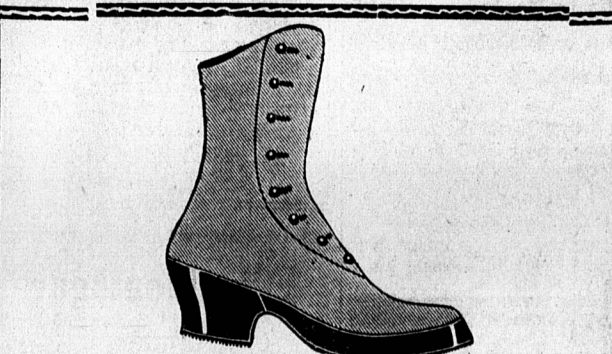
A WHISTLER STORY.

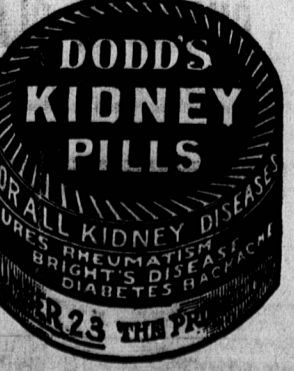
