"MRS. KATHARINE LENTE STEVENSON, for four years the Corresponding Secretary of the National Women's Christian Temperance Union of the United States and for five years one of the editors of the official organ of the W. C. T. U., The Union Signal, is the daughter and the grand daughter of Methodist Ministers. Her father was for more than fifty years an honored member of the New York Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The daughter in early life showed a marked ability in the lines of writing and public speaking and, at the age of twenty, felt a distinct call to the Christian ministry. She fitted herself for that work, graduating from the School of Theology of Boston University in the year 1881. She had been for five years previous to that date a licensed preacher in the Methodist Church. The General Conference of 1880, however, declared not alone against the ordination of women in the Methodist Church, but also against their being licensed, and Miss Lente's case was made the test case for that decision. Turned away from the ministry of her first choice Miss Lente soon found a wide open door in the abundant ministry of the W. C. T. U. She had been a member of the organization almost from its beginning but did not assume an official position until several years after her marriage. She then passed swiftly through the various positions of County and State Superintendent to be State Corresponding Secretary for the W. C. T. U. of Massachusetts. This position she held for ten years and was unanimously re-elected for the third time. The National Convention of 1893, however, called her to higher service and, wholly without her own knowledge, she was appointed one of the official editors. This position she held for one year and then, on the death of Mrs. Woodbridge, the Cor. Sec., she was elected to that office. She left it last year to assume the duties of state president of Massachusetts. As a speaker Mrs. Stevenson is clear, logical convincing as well as easy and graceful. Her broad plans, swift intuition and spirit of love that "thinketh no evil" make her a realizer and harmonizer along all W. C. T. U. lines. But humanity is her field and every movement that guarantees the uplift of human life toward the Christ standard claims her active loyalty. Her range of thought is shown in the various subjects upon which she speaks; the present social problem occupying a large share of her thought and work. She has been for two and a half years a resident in a Social Settlement in the heart of one of Chicago's congested districts and so has gained her facts at first hand. Her logic is as keen as her intuition. Nelson Sizer, the great Phrenologist, said of her years ago "that intellect of yours is like a detective, it shadows an error till it either trees it or burrows it." Mrs. Stevenson has written very widely for other papers and periodicals and some of her songs and poems are well known to a large and appreciative circle.—Mrs. Katharine Lente Stevenson will address a meeting in Charlottetown on Aug. 29th
