ACCEPTED A CALL.—Rev. W. B. Hinson, pastor of the First Baptist church of Vancouver, has accepted a call to the First Baptist church of San Diego, Cal. Mr. Hinson, who is considered one of the foremost pulpit orators, recently preached in the local Baptist churches.

THE war is on about the street lighting at Springhill. The Edison Electric Co. is putting up a fight; they have put out the lights and requested the shops using their lights to put them out on closing, or close their shutters. The town council have called for tenders to light the town.

THE Victoria Colonist of 18th says:—Commissioner Eva Booth, of the Salvation Army, will be here in Nelson for the first time on Saturday and Sunday next. The Salvationists in this city are looking forward with great pleasure to her visit. Those who have had the privilege of hearing Miss Booth speak will be glad to hear her again.

THE Toronto Globe of April 23rd says:—A deputation from the I. O. F., consisting of Dr. Millman, Supreme Physician; Mr. H. Collins, Supreme Treasurer; Mr. Harper, Mr. Dan Rose, Rev. Mr. McGillivray and Dr. Wright, waited upon the Attorney-General and Dr. Howard Hunter, Inspector of Insurance, Saturday and urged the enactment of reciprocal legislation admitting American fraternal societies to do business in Ontario. It was pointed out that in some of the States of the union there are provisions favorable to Canadian societies in force, while in others there were threats being made of retaliatory legislation if American organizations were not treated with greater consideration in Canada. The speakers for the deputation were Dr. Millman and Mr. Harper. The Hon. Mr. Gibson pointed out the great difficulties in the way of carrying out such a proposal and said that in any event the present session was too far advanced to permit of any legislation in the direction desired.

THE MINSTREL SHOW.—The Minstrel Show, under the auspices of the members of the League of the Cross, in the Lyceum next Monday night will be one of the merriest and most entertaining ever held in Charlottetown. The songs are the latest and most popular airs in minstrelsy and the quick and ballad are nicely balanced. The rich voices of the boys ring out in the catchy choruses in excellent time and style and the circle is one bit of life from the rise to the fall of the curtain. PROFIT IN PATENTS.—The Banner of Dunkirk, N. Y., says that Dewitt C. Noble, of that city, who was granted a patent on a bicycle tire a few weeks ago, was subsequently offered \$5,000 for a half interest in it, but this he declined. He says his figure is just twice that amount. According to the Orange County (Cal.) Herald, Henry Bundy & Frank Young, were jointly granted a patent for a billiard tip which screws on to the stick, thus doing away with the troublesome glueing method. They have, says this Journal, been offered \$2,000 for a third interest. It is gratifying to learn that the labors of Ottmar Mergenthaler, the inventor of the great type-setting machine, did not go unrewarded, as has been stated many times. It is stated that over \$1,000,000 were turned over in cash to Mr. Mergenthaler after his machine had been fully perfected and was adopted for general use. Shortly before his death, he sold the remaining lot of stock held by him for more than \$300,000. Nor do his profits end here, for the royalties which he received and which will continue to his heirs, will amount to a great deal of money. (Communication of M. M.
