## SUMMER SCHOOL IN YARMOUTH

Interesting Sessions Held Last Week—Guests of the Town of Yarmouth.

YARMOUTH, July 20.—(Special).—On Sunday last special reference to the Summer School was made in the churches of the town. The attendance of the members of the school at the several services was large.

Monday was ushered in by a downpour of rain, which necessitated the postponement of the first excursion as planned. An interesting public meeting was held in the evening. Dr. Inch, Superintendent of Education, Fredericton, N. B., spoke on the general question of Education. Principal Sloan of the Truro Normal School spoke on employment for teachers and pupils during the holidays. Dr. Hay of St. John and Principal Campbell of Truro spoke along the same line.

Tuesday morning was bright and fair, just the day for the postponed excursion. After the morning classes and dinner, the school took boat for Markland. A short sail brought them to that delightful summer resort. Leaving the boat the first point visited was the lighthouse, to the top of which many (not all) the members of the school went. This building is upwards of fifty feet high from the rock on which it stands, which rock is one hundred feet above sea level, giving a total altitude for the light of one hundred and fifty feet. The next point visited was the fog whistle, so frequently used here, the automatic working of which was explained to the visitors.

Then the vast rocks of Cape Fouchon were examined under the direction of Dr. Bailey, who, after the examination, gave an instructive address on coastal configuration illustrating his points by the coast before his auditors.

At the conclusion of this the school gathered and examined the peculiar plants of the locality under the direction of Dr. Hay. When a number of specimens had been collected Dr. Hay gave an address on the different classes of plants with special reference to water relations. He divided them into water plants, drough plants, and plants midway between the two. He also spoke of plants in relation to their inanimate surroundings, in their relation to each other, and in their relation to animal life. Many members received new ideas to aid them in their study of nature, and new inspiration to pursue this fascinating study. After a photograph of the excursionists was taken by Mr. Matthews, all proceeded to the Markland Hotel where a sumptuous dinner was spread for the school. Not the least enjoyable hour of the day was the hour spent in the dining hall of the Markland. The entire expense of the outing dinner included was the gift of the town of Yarmouth, the hospitality of which is proverbial.

### KITE CARRIED BOY.

New York, July 20.—While flying a kite on the roof of his home at No. 1,010 Stebbins avenue, the Bronx, yesterday, Robert Matthews, aged eleven, fell one hundred feet to the pavement, receiving internal injuries which may prove fatal. He was taken to Lebanon Hospital. When the accident occurred Robert and his elder brother, William, were playing together. William asked Robert to hold the cord attached to the kite while he went below for a moment. The little lad, however, was not strong enough to control the kite, which in its zigzag flight carried him over the edge of the roof.

## CREWS MUTINED IN BIG BATTLE

PARIS, July 21.—According to the St. Petersburg correspondent of La Liberte Admiral Rojestvensky, in his report on the battle of the Sea of Japan, which resulted in the practical annihilation of his fleet, says that his ships were bad. They had been not only hastily but dishonestly built. The thickness of their armor did not agree with the official figures in the case of any of the vessels. Moreover, it was of inferior quality. The shells were bad. Two-thirds of them did not explode. None of the ships was able to carry the necessary coal. None of them attained the guaranteed speed. The engines and boilers were poor, and likewise required repairs. Two-thirds of the crews, including those of Vice-Admiral Nebogatoff's squadron, were incapable. The gunners were ignorant of the elementary laws of firing. A mutiny occurred while the fleet was at Madagascar, and fourteen men were executed. Admiral Rojestvensky had to train guns on two of his ships, the Admiral Seniavin and Admiral Apraxine, to restore order. The crews had decided secretly to surrender to the enemy. This was discovered too late. There was another mutiny in Vice-Admiral Nebogatoff's squadron, near Formosa Island, and Admiral Rojestvensky had difficulty in preventing the mutineers from seizing the greater part of the squadron. Admiral Rojestvensky saw from the outset of the battle that the Admiral Seniavin and Admiral Apraxine were not fighting, and were ignoring orders; they only fired when he sent torpedo boats to them and threatened to sink them unless they obeyed.

If Admiral Rojestvensky had not been wounded at the beginning of the battle, the result might have been different. Almost simultaneously with his removal to a torpedo boat, Admiral Enquist disappeared. Admiral Foelkersham was killed, and Admiral Nebogatoff, who was unpopular with the sailors, was obliged to take command. Then the rout began. Admiral Nebogatoff's orders were ignored. It was everyone for himself. The crews of some of the ships threatened to kill their officers unless they surrendered.

Admiral Rojestvensky confirms what is generally known of the shattering and scattering of his fleet. He describes the attempt to blow up the Orei after she had surrendered. He says that a party of engineers, and young officers were surprised by the Japanese just as they were about to fire the ship's magazine, and a struggle ensued. If the Orei's crew had supported their officers the conspiracy would have succeeded, but none of the men stirred. The Admiral confirms the reports already published that he relied on the fog to enable him to get through the Straits, but says it lifted two hours too soon.

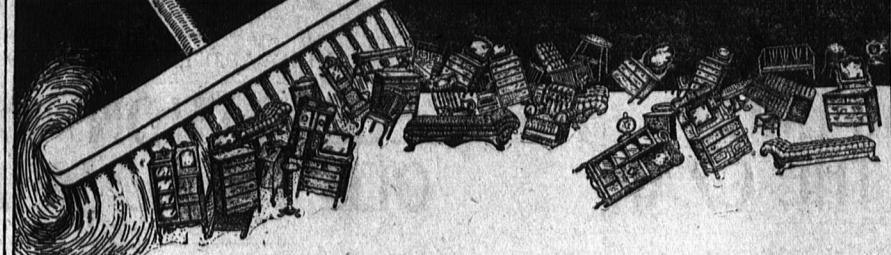
