There were several cases in which the number of votes was equal between two or more different names in which case the tie was decided in favor of the name having most votes for the higher places on the list. A vote for first or second place was allowed to count for more than a vote for, say, tenth or fifteenth place. There were many votes given in favor of other names than the twenty printed above. For Hon. Daniel Gordon and the late Rev. George Hodgson the votes were equal in number to those numbered nineteen and twenty above, but not quite equal in their average ranking on the lists received at this office.

LIVELY TILT IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS

French Members on Sunday Bill—Piche, Rivet and Bourassa Get Excited—Act to Prevent Usury—Railway Subsidy Bill—Materials Must be Purchased in Canada—Preston Scored—Monk Moves His Dismissal.

OTTAWA, July 3.—(Special)—A lively row developed in Parliament between the French members today.

It arose out of the Sunday Observance Bill. Piche and Rivet of Montreal, bitterly attacked Bourassa for accusing them of betraying their countrymen in their agreement to the Bill.

Bourassa in reply said he and Piche and Rivet had agreed to fight the Bill.

Piche denied the compact, but Lavergne declared he was present and heard it made.

Bourassa further declared that Piche had sent money and men into Labelle county against him last election but he had driven them out of the constituency.

This closed the incident. The Act to prevent usury was passed. In committee on the Railway subsidy bill an amendment from Logan was accepted declaring that the materials for

the subsidised lines must be purchased in Canada when they could be secured at fair price and in sufficient quantities.

At the evening session Monk moved that Preston should be removed from the office of commissioner of immigration. He claimed he had violated instructions in sending skilled labor to Canada and had not been frank with the North Atlantic Committee.

Oliver defended Preston and after discussion Monk's motion was defeated.

SAD DROWNING AT SALISBURY

Frank Burnes Aged Sixteen Drowned in Presence of Father, Mother and Friends—Sad Ending of a Fishing Party—Mother Prostrated by the Sad Event.

MONCTON, July 3.—(Special)—Before his parent's eyes Frank Burnes, aged 16, son of H. C. Burnes, a well-known merchant of Salisbury was drowned last evening on little River.

Mr. and Mrs. Burnes and family with others went on a fishing excursion yesterday morning. Towards evening the party were fishing at Milton's dam.

All but Frank Burnes had given up fishing and were resting. Young Burnes stood on the flume and

the planks being slippery he lost his footing and fell into the large pool below.

His father and mother and others were sitting on the bank within a few feet of where the lad went in.

The father immediately rushed to his son's assistance, but being unable to swim, could not reach the spot. Planks were formed into a raft but the boy could not be reached, and quickly disappeared. Mrs. Burnes was completely prostrated by the sad event.

KILLED WHILE DRIVING TEAM

Caught Between Wagon Wheel and Stone and Choked to Death

DUNCHURCH, Ont., July 3.—(Special)—While teaming to the James Bay Railway about thirty miles from Perry Sound, Jas. McEwen, a young man, was thrown from his wagon and his neck caught between a wheel and a stone. He was choked to death.

SUICIDE FROM A LOVE AFFAIR

Shot Himself in Front of the Young Woman's Residence

HAMILTON, July 3.—(Special)—Charles Scott shot himself in the head last evening and it is doubtful if he will recover. The act was due to a love affair. Scott had been keeping company with Amelia Crockett and had a disagreement with the girl.

Last night he went in front of the Crockett house and shot himself.

AN ENGINEER JUMPED TO DEATH

From a Bridge Over Vermillion River, Leaving Wife and Children

LETHBRIDGE, July 3.—(Special)—W. E. Nicholson who recently resigned his position as Engineer on the Canadian Northern committed suicide by putting a rope round his neck and jumping from a bridge over Vermillion River. He leaves a widow and two children.

NIAGARA'S EDDY CLAIMS VICTIM

Louis Prince Drowned There Yesterday While Swimming

NIAGARA FALLS, July 3.—(Special)—Walter Pierce, aged twenty, son of Louis Pierce of this city was drowned in the big eddy just above the Maid of the Mist landing while swimming.

SPINE BROKEN PROVED FATAL

Walter Gilber Fell from Staging and Was Fatally Injured

ST. JOHN, July 3.—(Special)—An accident which has since terminated fatally occurred yesterday morning, when Walter Gilbert, St. Stephens, employe of J. S. Gibbon & Co., fell from a staging above the coal sheds where was working to the floor of the shed below, a distance of about 15 feet.

As the result of the injuries he received he died this morning about 8:30 o'clock at the General Public Hospital. His spine was broken.

LIBRALS MEET IN CONVENTION

At the Queen's County Liberal Convention held yesterday in the Kindergarten Hall, there was a large attendance of delegates from all parts of the county. A letter from L. E. Prowse was read stating that the demands of his business were such that he had to ask that his name be not submitted as a candidate.

Horace Hazard was also proposed but the name was withdrawn as Mr. Hazard was of the opinion that it was too early to make the nomination. Addresses were made by the President of the Convention, Nelson Rattenbury by Geo. E. Full, and others.

Nominations were then made bringing forward the following: A. B. Warburton proposed by Edward B. Lane, Dunstaffnage, seconded by H. J. Palmer, Charlottetown. Hon. George W. Simpson proposed by Cyrus Crosby, Bonshaw, seconded by Charles Warren, North River.

George E. Full proposed by Donald Andrews, Hunter River, seconded by Adam Brown, Hunter River. Hon. George E. Hughes moved by Albert Vickers seconded by William McCabe, Fort Augustus. F. N. Nash, editor of The Patriot, was proposed and seconded but a letter was read from Mr. Nash, who is now in Halifax, stating that he would positively decline to allow his name to go before the Convention.

THE SAD DEATH OF L. R. H. PIGOTT

The Free Press, Winnipeg, of the 30th June ult., to hand last night contains the following:—Lewis R. H. Pigott, of the Pigott Tailoring Co., McLean block, committed suicide last evening by taking carbolic acid. The act was deliberate, and it is thought that despondency over financial troubles was the cause.

Last night after dinner Pigott and his chum, A. C. McMillan, who shared apartments with him at 334 Carlton street, went out for a stroll. About 6:50 Pigott stated that he wanted to go to his room for something he had forgotten and left McMillan. The latter returned to the room about 11 o'clock and found his friend stretched out on the bed dead. Dr. Inglis, coroner, was at once notified and took the case in hand.

Pigott was lying on the top of the bed with a portion of his clothing removed. On a stand beside the bed was a glass

containing a small quantity of carbolic acid. There was no disturbance of any kind of the articles in the room, nor was there a message left for friends. He had evidently gone home, taken the acid and died without a struggle. When found the body was almost cold and death must have taken place a couple of hours before.

Mr. McMillan could give no clue as to the probable cause of the deed beyond the fact that last night he had been talking to the deceased when the latter made use of the expression "Life is hardly worth living." He gave no explanation as to why he thought so, but it is supposed he had been brooding over troubles of a private nature. Pigott was about 21 years of age and had been in Winnipeg for about four years. He was a single man and a native of Charlottetown.
