LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

Wednesday, April 27.

The House met at 11 a. m. Mr. McWilliams asked the Commissioner of Public Works what action the government intend to take in respect to a petition (dated April 1899) from the inhabitants of Lots 11, 12, 13, 14, and 16, Prince County, praying for the construction of a bridge at Grand River, lot 14.

Hon. Mr. McLean said the Engineer made a full report in regard to the bridge. Considering the straitened finances of the country it was a question whether it would not be better to put a steamer on that ferry instead of the scow as at present.

Mr. Campbell asked the Leader of the Government if he had received a resolution from the inhabitants of Centre Line Road, and the residents of Hope River, passed at a public meeting condemning the action of the Supervisor of that district in changing the location of Centre Line Road and asking to have the old route restored; if so, what action the government intend to take in the matter?

Hon. Mr. Farquharson said he had received the resolution and that it was very strong in condemning the Government Supervisors. The trouble was they thought the old road would be closed before the new road was fit for travel. He wrote to the Supervisors that the old road should not be closed until the new road was in first class condition and that is where the matter stands.

Hon. H. C. McDonald introduced a Bill to provide for a short-hand reporter in certain courts. Read a first time.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson moved the House into committee to consider the bill to regulate the Registry of Deeds and Instruments relating to the Title of Lands and to repeal the laws heretofore passed for that purpose.

Mr. Farquharson moved that the Bill be referred to a sub-committee of the House to report later.

The bill to amend the Act relating to Life Insurance was read a first time and after some consideration referred to a sub-committee of the House.

House took recess to meet a 3 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

House met at 4 p. m.

Mr. A. Peters moved the House into committee, Mr. Wise in the chair, to consider an Act passed in the 61st year of Her present Majesty's reign, entitled: An Act respecting assignments for the benefit of creditors. Bill agreed to without amendment and ordered to be read a third time tomorrow.

A Bill respecting the Hillsboro Railway and General Traffic Bridge was read a second time. Referred to a committee of the whole House. Mr. Wise in the chair. It was still under consideration when the House rose at 6 to meet at 10 this morning.

The public is looking forward with much interest to hearing Mr. Palmer's paper upon Man Primeval at the Meeting of the Natural History Society next Tuesday.
