INTERESTING CRIME MYSTERY

EAST BOURNE, England, August 23.—One of the greatest mysteries in the annals of August crime seem likely to be placed on record in connection with the four murders and suicide committed by Hicks Murray here, on Aug. 19.

Ever since that date the detective department and a host of reporters have been investigating every possible clue to the murderer-suicide's identity, but no progress has been made in solving the problem. He was supposed to have been an officer in a Scottish regiment, but this has been proved erroneous. The belief gains ground that Murray was the black sheep of a prominent family, altho there is nothing to demonstrate this. In his marriage certificate Murray gave his father's occupation as barrister, but no trace of such a person can be found. Beyond this certain, and his claim to have been a soldier in India Murray never spoke of his past. The burial of Murray and the woman and three children who were his victims, is take place tomorrow at the expense of the town.

HALIFAX TRACKMEN GO ON STRIKE

HALIFAX, Aug. 22—Eighty trackmen working on the I. C. R. at Richmond are on strike for higher wages. They were engaged repairing tracks and at general repair work in Richmond yard. They were getting \$1.60 a day and they asked for \$2. The railway authorities declined to acquiesce in the request and the men accordingly walked out and now the work in the yard has practically ceased. A lot of men to take the places of the strikers were brought to Halifax today but on arrival they were met by the strikers and were prevailed on not to work. The newcomers were taken to Truro on a later train in the afternoon and the strike here is still on.

A BIG FOX DEAL.

NORTH SYDNEY, Aug. 22—What is believed to be the biggest deal in the fox industry ever consummated in Cape Breton, was put through last week, when Dr. Donald McPhail, a native of Whytecoomagh, but now a prominent physician of New York, sold from his newly formed ranch at Whytecoomagh three female black pups for \$18,000 cash. The purchasers were a company which only started lately in the Upper provinces, and were taken away by their owners. Dr. McPhail, when called upon the phone regarding the sale of the three valuable pups, although very reticent in the matter did not deny that the sale had been made. He said he did not care to discuss the matter as fox raising in Cape Breton was only in its infancy. His ranch at Whytecoomagh is admirably adapted for the business, and its progressive owner is sparing nothing to make the business one of the best in the country with the hope that others will follow suit. There is no reason why this most lucrative of all industries should not be successfully conducted right here in Cape Breton. As Dr. McPhail told The North Sydney Herald representative, fox farming in Cape Breton is just in its beginning here, and in time it will be very profitable. And it is gratifying to know that at least one of our native born has the pluck and the necessary capital to invest in the business, which no doubt in a very few years will be taken up by others.

(Canadian Press.) MONTREAL, Aug. 24—Leggmen robbed the McLaurin Lbs Co's safe last night, having two watchmen and exchanged shots with the police and escaped. CANADIAN CANALS FREE TO AMERICANS. OTTAWA, Aug. 22—The stand which Canada will take in augmenting Britain's protest against any violation of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty, which may appear in the Panama canal bill when finally amended and ratified, is being strengthened daily by the mass of statistics and records being collected by the various departments and by representatives from many bodies interested in the outcome of the treaty. Though there is little outward activity apparent, officials are industriously engaged in marshalling material for Canada's brief, and with the return of Hon. George E. Foster to the capital tomorrow even more systematic action is looked for. As the import of certain clauses of the bill, as it is at present stands, comes to be realized, and their full effect upon Canadian interests is considered the objection of Canadian bodies are becoming crystallized. In addition to representation undoubtedly being made to the government by the Canadian Pacific and other transcontinental officials, the Canadian steel and coal interests of Nova Scotia, it is understood, are joining in the protest against the coastwise shipping exemption. This clause, owing to the large quantities of steel rails and other steel products being shipped by Nova Scotia to Vancouver (at present round the Horn) is considered to be of very vital importance to these industries. Though there is no probability of retaliatory measures upon the part of Canada, certain facts calculated to emphasize concessions or many years enjoyed by American shipping on free and equal terms with Canada, will undoubtedly be embodied in the brief which will be submitted to Mr. Bryce. It is pointed out that Canada's canals are free to everyone. The Saint Ste. Marie and the St. Lawrence canals represent a capital ex-

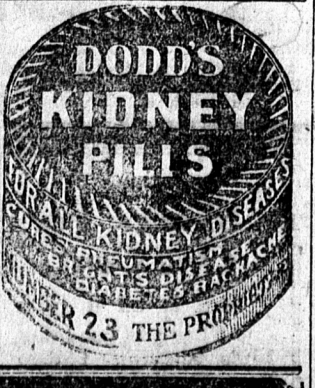
SPORTING NEWS.

penditure by the Canadian government of \$99,311,890, besides the great expenditure made by the Imperial government, the records of which were destroyed by fire in Montreal in 1852. On the Lachine canal \$13,000,000 have been expended; on the Welland, \$29,850,000; on the Soo, \$8,000,000, while the Welland canal is being enlarged at a cost between \$25,000,000 and \$40,000,000. This canal system, it will be pointed out, is maintained by the Dominion at enormous expense. The interest charge, it is computed, on the capital outlay to date, only 3 1/2 per cent., would be equal to a contribution of nine cents per ton mile. To this must be added the annual cost of maintenance. Despite this, of the 2,537,629 tons of freight which passed through the Welland canal in 1911 only 1,296,480 tons or 51 per cent, was composed of United States products passing mainly from one American port to another. This free use of Canadian canals by Americans, who have never paid a cent towards the cost of either construction or maintenance is considered, apart from the undoubted term

of the treaty, to be one of the strongest points in Canada's case in opposition to discrimination against Canadian shipping through the Panama canal. The total tonnage of Canadian vessels using Canadian canals last year was 9,072,192, while the tonnage of United States vessels using the same canals, free and untrammelled was 1,231,192, or almost double. In view of these facts Canada expects to be able to submit a case which should be calculated to strengthen the case of Britain very materially.
