REMEMBRANCE DAY AT THE CHARLOTTETOWN POST OFFICE.—Remembrance Day, Monday November 11th, 1935, the following order of service will be rendered the public:—The General Delivery, Registration, and Stamp Vendor's windows will be open, from 8.00 a. m. to 2.00 o'clock noon. All outgoing mails will be closed at the regular hours. Letter carriers will make one complete morning delivery, and the rural carriers will make their usual trip. There will be no mid-day street letter and parcel box collection.
