Montreal Witness, which has been very friendly to the Laurier Government, has become a very candid friend of late, and charges that the ministers have abandoned tariff reform, while owing to high duties the farmers are paying five dollars for the value of four. The Witness apparently believes that the abandonment of tariff reform is due to Mr. Tarte, who is in some sort a protectionist and is strong enough to have his own way in the Cabinet. The Witness has long had very little love for Mr. Tarte.

The Boston Herald of the 15th instant published a despatch from Washington stating that Secretary Hay had received a despatch from Consul-General Dickinson at Sofia to the effect that he had arranged for the release of Miss Stone and Madam Tsilka on the following day. A ransom of \$60,000 was to be paid and the brigands stipulated that no proceedings were to be taken against them. Mr. Dickinson had before secured the consent of the Washington Government to these conditions.

CITY AND COUNTRY

Guardian Correspondents Everywhere.

The success of the winter course of public meetings of the Natural History and Antiquarian Society is assured if future meetings prove as interesting as was the initial gathering last night. The program consisted of informal talks by the President, the Secretary and Mr. John MacSwain. Mr. Newson exhibited a fine specimen of ripple mark and described its formation; also the large tooth and a claw of a bear, together with arrow heads and spear heads, found in an Indian shell heap at Rustico, reporting also the finding of a canine tooth barbed for fishing and a fine specimen of an Indian pipe. Mr. Watson detailed the work of the Society since its last public meeting, reported the discoveries made at the annual outing, and exhibited specimens of new plants and other interesting objects found during the summer. Mr. MacSwain gave an interesting lecture upon the mussels found upon our shores and described the fish called the Lump Sucker rarely met with in our waters. Miss Pippy kindly lent a fine collection of shells to illustrate Mr. MacSwain's remarks, and Mrs. Daniel Davies generously gave to the Society a cake of wax obtained from the berries of the bay shrub (myrica cerifera) from which the earliest settlers of this Island made the candles which furnished their only artificial light. Questions were asked and answered by many persons present and one of the most interesting meetings in the history of the society was brought to a close by the announcement that at the next meeting a paper will be read upon Astronomy.

DAIRYING.

Letter From Mr. J. Ruddick.

The following letter was received by Mr. Robert Jenkins too late to be laid before the last meeting of the cheese-makers. It will no doubt be read with interest by dairymen generally:

OTTAWA, Nov. 7th. DEAR MR. JENKINS,—Replying to yours re the proposed dairy classes, I may say that I heartily endorse the scheme and will be glad to lend what assistance I can to make it a success.

In fixing the date it will be well to consider the question of milk supply. The quantity of milk required will depend somewhat on the number of students and the size of cheese vats which are available. Less milk can be utilized to better advantage with small sized vats than with the large ones.

Mr. Morrow will be able to gauge that part of it, but I would say you should at least have 3000 lbs of milk daily. If it could be delivered in the evening for use early the following morning it would suit the class work best. Two vats with a capacity of say 1500 each would be better than one large one. Even smaller than that would do but I always like to get as near factory conditions as I can. Our Mr. Mitchell could attend as far as I know at present any time during February or March. I presume he is well enough known to need little introduction. It will do to say he is a cheesemaker of considerable experience and was for several years Instructor in milk testing at Guelph. He has been Superintendent of creameries for the Department for 3 years. He will take charge of the class, give instruction in milk testing and deliver lectures while Mr. Morrow, can take immediate charge of the cheese instruction. As I hope to attend your annual convention, I could spend a day or two at the school if the dates come together.

TORONTO AND SUNDAY CARS.

TORONTO, Nov. 15.—The Lord's Day Alliance people are bound not to leave a stone unturned in the battle against Sunday desecration.
