MAPLE LEAFS EVEN SERIES WITH 5-1 VICTORY

Toronto Shoots Three Goals In Third Period Of Rugged, Bruising Game

(By Sydney Gruson, Canadian Press Staff Writer) TORONTO, April 7—Fully recovered, the young Toronto Maple Leafs broke down the weakened defenses of Chicago Black Hawks in the third period tonight, rapped in three swift goals and beat Hawks 5-1 to tie the Stanley Cup series at one game each.

A sell-out crowd, of 14,479 watched the weakened Hawks, without their regular goalkeeper and right wing, collapse in the face of a determined Leaf offensive midway through the third period.

Gordon Drillon fired one and George Parsons two of the three goals that broke up the game. Rookie Paul Goodman, forced to play by a decision of Frank Calder, National Hockey League President, declaring Alfie Moore ineligible, tended goal for Hawks. In the first major league game of his three-year professional career, Goodman let in two goals that might have been stopped. On the others he didn't have a chance.

Moore was the goalkeeper Hawks drafted at the last moment to replace the injured Mike Karakas of the first game won by Hawks 1-0. Tonight's result sent the Leafs to Chicago for the third and fourth games all square in the series.

The fine offensive edge Leafs started to a three-straight triumph over Boston Bruins for the league championship returned and they were back on the start. There was more speed to their attack and their defence, from goalkeeper Walter Broda out, was sound.

Drillon fired the first goal of the game just a minute and 42 seconds after it started. In the first period, he was the only one in which they came out even. Hawks looked almost as good as the high-flying Leafs. Alf Seibert tied the game at 8:31. But Leaf pressure couldn't be sent and Harvey Jackson's first goal sent them into a lead they never relinquished at 8:10 of the second period. Hawks, also without winger Mush March, who aggravated a groin injury in the first game, didn't return after a sprained ankle after that.

The collapse started with Drillon's second goal—his sixth of the playoffs—at 9:44 of the third period. Within a minute and 20 seconds Parsons shot two more, both backhand drives that left Goodman flatfooted.

The hard bumping took a heavy toll on Hawks. Hawk in the first period suffered a broken nose for Doc Romnes and head and eye cuts at needed stitches for Alex Levinsky. Romnes, Jenkins and Louis Trudel, Romnes didn't return after he was injured in the second period. Leafs didn't escape unscathed. Murphy Chamberlain, not playing after suffering a broken thumb in a first period, Jackson's left leg, injured in the Boston clash, took another bump and he was going to it at the end.

"You can say that again," said defenceman Reggie Hamilton, "they were certainly tough out there tonight and with the teams crowding to them in Chicago its a cinch they won't be any easier."

Harvey Jackson, who notched the important goal which regained the lead for Leafs in the second frame, was the happiest member of the winning squad. "Well kid," he greeted, "I finally clicked for one and it was a beauty eh? The pay-off shot at that but I got it on the old sucker play. I just skated in, shifted to the right and feinted the goalie Rampoala, Schmidt, Nerbonne, Wents, Pinkham and Rhawn, McGarry, Brusetti, Limartina.

Manager Bill Stewart and his Hawks took the defeat in stride and vowing they would end the struggle by taking two at home. The Hawk mentor said he didn't think much of the Hawks chances after Doc Romnes' crazy play-out in the first period. Romnes suffered a broken nose which he claimed to have received when crossed-checked by Toronto's captain Red Horner.

Art Webe, Louis Trudel, Roger Jenkins and Alex Levinovsky were other Chicagoans who were forced to take time out for repairs to cuts.

CHICAGO, April 7—(AP)—Extensive damage to orchards and power networks was reported today in the broad area of the United States swept by spring storms. Fresh snow plagued 12 states from Texas to New England as thousands of laborers struggled to clear highways buried under Wednesday's heavy fall.

By WILLIE KLEIN (Newark Ledger) SEBRING, Fla., April 7—Mark down the championship Newark Bears as the toughest team to beat this year, and you have an idea of the probable course of the 1938 International League pennant race.

Skip the thought of another record flag triumph by 25 1-2 games, but keep the battering bruins in front when there's talk of pennants, for the principal New York Yankee farm team is loaded with dynamite again and bulging with rookie stars.

Smiling Johnnie Neun, who played first base for the championship Bears of 1932, has stepped into the managerial post relinquished by Oscar Vitt, who shifted to Cleveland.

The Bears will start with the same outfield cast, a completely overhauled infield, an experienced and hard-hitting catching staff and a promising pitching corps.

A heavy toll was taken of the 1937 "wonder team's" mound brigade. Of last year's crew only Phil Page and Marius Russon, left-handed pitcher and right-handed batter, respectively, are back. But there are many promising recruits in the new batch.

The outfield lines up the same as last year with Charlie Keller, league batting champion, in right; the veteran Bob Seeds in centre and hustling Jimmy Gleason in left. This trio promises to hit well over .300 and ranks with the best.

The great infield of George McQuinn, Joe Gordon, Nolan Richardson and Babe Dahlgren was being washed away and in its place Les Scarsella, slugging first baseman on option from Cincinnati; Herman (Ham) Schulte, second baseman from Kansas City; Buddy Blair, brilliant shortstop with Birmingham last year, and Merrill May, returning from Oakland to hold down third base.

With Buddy Rosar back from the Yanks, the No. 1 catching job is signed, sealed and delivered.
