### Premier Bennett Expected To Disembark At Quebec Friday - Health Much Improved.

OTTAWA, May 15—Prime Minister R. B. Bennett will arrive back in Ottawa from the King's Jubilee celebrations in London, Saturday morning to find many problems awaiting his return to active administration duties.

A wireless message was received from the Duchess of York at sea today from the Prime Minister stating that he had been enjoying an "excellent voyage" and that he would disembark at Quebec Friday and enroute at once for Ottawa.

### Canada's Trade Increases With United States

WASHINGTON, May 15—Imports from Canada in March were \$20,195,000 against \$18,198,000 in March, 1934, the United States Department of Commerce announced today. This was an increase of \$1,997,000. United States exports to Canada in March of this year were \$26,004,000 against \$25,358,000 in the corresponding month of last year, an increase of \$646,000.

## France And Russia Agree To Push Security Scheme

(By Guardian's Special Wire) MOSCOW, May 15—A plea for co-operation by other nations to turn the new Franco-Soviet mutual assistance treaty into a general Eastern European pact was made today by Pierre Laval, French Foreign Minister, and officials of the Soviet Union at the conclusion of their discussions here.

Complete satisfaction with the Franco-Soviet treaty, without mention of its further reinforcement, was expressed in some quarters, was evident in their announcement. French circles expressed great satisfaction, moreover, with the statement by Joseph Stalin, Dictator of the Soviet Union, that the U. S. S. R.
