POTATO SEED BY MAIL

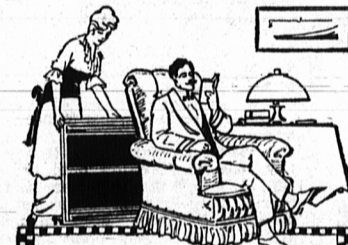

STRAWBERRIES IN WINTER

After permanent frost has set in and the ground is quite solid, the plants should be covered with a light coat of clean straw, that which will not pack closely over the plants being the best, marsh hay being very good and free from weed seeds. This mulch will prevent the alternate thawing and freezing of the ground in the Spring and protect the plants if there is not much snow in Winter. A heavy mulch may cause heating in the Spring before it is removed, and as a light mulch of two or three inches is sufficient, more should not be used. It has been occasionally recommended to grow something between the rows of strawberries during the latter part of Summer, which could be used to hold the snow in the Winter, but this is not a desirable method as, while growing, it exhausts the moisture from the soil at the expense of the strawberry plants. While plants will often come through the Winter without protection, it is best not to take any risks. After the frosty weather of early Spring is over and before the plants begin to grow, they should be uncovered and the straw put between the rows to keep the fruit clean. If the soil is one which bakes or dries out easily, it is a good plan to remove the mulch, cultivate, and put it back between the rows when conditions will be better for conserving moisture. As soon as the fruit has been picked, the straw should be removed altogether, and the plantation ploughed up, or, if left for another season, it should be weeded and the surface soil loosened with the cultivator so that the new runners may have a chance to root.
