THIS DAY IN HISTORY

CENTRAL AMERICANS CELEBRATE INDEPENDENCE DAY TO-DAY.

In miniature capitals blistered by the tropic sun and washed clean by tropical rains; in little plazas gay with the brilliant colorings of flags and flowers, all Central Americans will congregate to-day for the celebration of independence day. While

to-day is the actual anniversary of the overthrow of Spanish authority in all Central America, the fiesta usually covers four days. The municipal and national governments spend hundreds of thousands of dollars on these annual outbursts of patriotic enthusiasm.

Central America may be impoverished by continual revolutions; it may face the fearful fate of being swallowed up by the giant "Yankees" of the North; it may be too poor to pay its debts, to construct highways, to support public schools, but—

Central America is not, and never has been, too poor to lavish public funds on public fiestas.

"The glorious fifteenth"—oh, so glorious—they call the fifteenth of September in the little one-horse nations ruled by pure patriots who fill their pockets from the public exchequer and then engage passage to Europe.

The fiesta of independence is observed by everybody in Central America, except the few "Yankees" and Europeans who serve as agents for United Fruit and other corporations. For four days there are band concerts, parades by day and torchlight processions by night, banquets, fireworks, cocking, bull fights, and general and universal drunkenness. Everybody gets drunk except the babes in arms, the dark and often pretty ninas who have not yet attained freedom through matrimony, and the "Yakkee Pigs," who are slaves.

Central Americans begin their annual orgy on the fifteenth, because it is their own independence anniversary; they continue it over the sixteenth, because that is Mexico's day of freedom; they extend it over the seventeenth on general principles, and they wind it up on the eighteenth because that is Chile's national festival. And in addition to these good and sufficient reasons, the Central American enjoys the sensation of being drunk.

Having fun with "Yankee swine" is one of the pastimes of independence day. Hatred of Americans has been a creed of the Central American religion ever since Walker's filibustering expedition. A few years ago the Guatemalan government was forced to pay \$5,000 indemnity to an American hotel-keeper named Shine in Zapapa, Guatemala, who had been almost killed by a commandante engaged in celebrating the national festival.

Central America, called by the Spanish the Kingdom of Guatemala, achieved its freedom on Sept. 15, 1821. The Spanish governor, Gabriel Gaitan, favored the revolutionists, and was made the provisional president of the junta. In the following year the federation was disrupted by Iturbide, who annexed the country to his Mexican empire. The Congress of Salvador, opposing Iturbide's rule, passed an act annexing the country to the United States, and appointed commissioners to go to Washington to bring about the incorporation with the great republic. Before departure was taken, however, Iturbide abetted, and Salvador joined with the remainder of Central America in forming a confederacy. The attempted union was a failure, and the various states formed independent republics of their own. Many attempts have been made to revive the Central American Union, but, owing to petty jealousies, all have failed. Within the last few years large parts of Central America have been developed by American and European capital, and the governments of some of the countries are now practically controlled by these corporations.
