About 200 delegates attended the S. S. convention which met in the Presbyterian church here on Tuesday and Wednesday. The meetings were well attended and the interest well sustained.

Mr. Rafus Heckbert showed THE GUARDIAN correspondent on Wednesday a number of ripe strawberries picked in the vicinity of Summerside. Blossoms for a later crop are quite numerous.

Mr. F. St. George Stroud, member of the firm of W. B. Stroud & Sons, tea dealers, Montreal, left for home yesterday morning after spending some ten days visiting the business centre of the Province. He seems delighted with the appearance of things.

Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Enman, Station Agent, Summerside, left yesterday for Halifax to see the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall. Forty-one years ago last August, Mr. Enman, then a chubby youth, was among the many thousands who cheered for the Prince of Wales, now King Edward VII.

BUSINESS is comfortably brisk in Summerside just now; large quantities of potatoes are coming to market and changing hands at 25 cents a bushel; oats are active at 36 cents. Our streets generally present a somewhat lively appearance and storekeepers are on the lookout lest the ubiquitous dollar goes into some other one's till.

The oyster fishing of Richmond Bay, though it began four weeks ago next Monday, has not been so successful as usual owing to the prevalence of high winds; still a considerable quantity have been shipped as the number of men employed is larger than usual. The price paid at the shore ranges from two to four dollars a barrel according to grade.

YESTERDAY afternoon's session of the S. S. Convention opened with devotional service led by Rev. Edwin Smith, after which Miss Marion Mathew ably conducted a primary class before the large and appreciative audience. After singing a hymn an address was delivered by Rev. E. P. Calder, Summerside, entitled Bible Study and 20th century Civilization. The next on the program was the report of the Finance Committee, which was read by Mr. J. K. Ross and unanimously adopted. An address read by Rev. H. M. McIntosh followed The Potentiality of Childhood. The evening session of the Sunday School Convention, was largely attended. After devotional exercises Rev. D. B. McLeod took the chair, and asked for report of committee on resolutions. The chairman, Rev. Edwin Smith, read the following: The thanks of the Convention are tendered to the session and officers of the Presbyterian Church; to the organist and those assisting in the service of praise, and also to the citizens who have made our stay so pleasant and profitable. Resolutions passed. The report of the normal work, was read by Mr. D. Seaman, Charlottetown. It was very encouraging. This year classes are conducted in several sections, extending from Maddock to Cardigan. He gave as a fair estimate that 200 were engaged in the work. Of these 33 presented for the examination, and all passed. He referred to the interest in the work by the S. S. teachers, and said that from a better understanding would come a greater interest. This report was adopted. The presentation of diplomas followed. Miss Ida Gough then favored the audience with a solo. The meeting was addressed by Mr. Lawrence, Dr. Anderson and Rev. G. P. Raymond.
