lish newspapers. Another unique idea officially put forward was that no warship could be transferred from one flank to another, without due notice being given to the League of Nations.

Since 1921 the problem of private manufacture has dragged on without seeing very great progress because the opinion grew that as a whole, it could be better attacked by first solving the question of control of the traffic in arms from one country to another. This conclusion was based on the theory that the greatest international danger arose not from the free and untrammelled manufacture of arms, but from the unrestricted movement of these arms from one country to another. It is this phase of the problem which will be handled by the conference in May with the help of the United States.

However, with a solution of the international traffic problem in sight, attention has been concentrated anew on the problem of private manufacture, and hence the decision to examine this at Geneva.

The Labor interests of various countries have come out flatly in favor of a total and complete prohibition of private manufacture of arms, believing that this should be entrusted to governments and to governments alone.

**SALVATION ARMY OFFICER HONORED**

Adjutant Smith Receives First Class Decoration.

Adjutant Solomon Smith, a Newfoundland, who has been on service in India for seven years, has a place in the King's New Year honors, having received the Kaiser-i-Hind medal of the first class, says the War Cry. The Adjutant is in charge of the Nabhabad Settlement for Criminal tribes, and has a particularly "tough" collection in his care.

It will be interesting to know that the tribes referred to, is a criminal tribe, which gave the government of India a whole lot of trouble. They would not work, but lived entirely through-stealing from the other natives, so they were being constantly imprisoned.

Some years back the Army was approached on the subject and asked if they would take over the tribe, and teach them to work, till the land, raise cattle, and other things, and the result has been very marked, the tribe now being one of the most industrious in India, for which the honors were given.

The hearing of rebuttal evidence by the plaintiff was held in the afternoon after which Mr. Bentley K. C. addressed the jury on behalf of the defendant. At 5 o'clock Court adjourned until 10.30 this morning.

**Canada Has Place In Asquith Title**

LONDON, Feb. 10.—With reference to the statement that Mr. Asquith, former premier, who recently was elevated to the peerage, will in future be known as the "Earl of Oxford and Asquith," it is pointed out that in taking this title the Liberal leader assumes a dubious territorial rank. Asquith is the name of a place in Saskatchewan, near Regina, and is said to stand almost exactly in the centre of the British Empire.

**OSLA, Norway, Feb 10.**—Roald Amundsen will begin an airplane dash for the North Pole on June 1. The explorer's intention was made known today following successful trial flights of the two machines he expects to use. He will take off from Spitsbergen, on the edge of the Barents Sea.

**THE MARKETS**

(Canadian Press)

**MONTREAL, Feb. 10.**—Little business was transacted over the cable with foreign buyers for Canadian grain here today but there was some demand from New York exporters for Manitoba No. 5 wheat and a round lot sale was made at 14 1/2 cents per bushel under the Winnipeg May option C.I.F. bay ports and they also bid 9 cents per bushel under the May future for Manitoba No. 4 wheat. C.I.F. bay ports with sellers asking 7 cents per bushel under the export trade in barley and oats. The local market for oats was easier prices scored a decline of two cents per bushel Ontario No. 2 white being quoted unchanged at 67 1/2 No. 3 grade at 62 1/2 cents per bushel the volume business in the spring wheat flour market was small but prices were steady no change of any importance occurred in winter wheat graded. The trade in millfeed was quiet although the price tendency was firm the demand for rolled oats was limited. The egg another cent per dozen extreme dullness marked the butter trade but prices were well maintained. The tone of the cheese situation was firm with today's made No. 1 white and colored goods quoted at 20 1/4 to 20 3/4 cents per pound and No. 2 grade at 19 1/4 to 19 3/4 cents per pound beans were unchanged at \$2.90 per bushel.

**Dominion Live Stock Branch**

**OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 10.**—The egg market is showing an easier tendency and "jobbing" prices at Toronto have declined 3 to 1 cents the milder weather is helping production and imports from the United States are fairly heavy during the past week. 8 cars of Toronto State firsts have arrived Ontario, Toronto specials jobbing 55 extras 52, firsts, Montreal steadier prices unchanged. Winnipeg jobbing extras 55 to 60 firsts 50 to 55 seconds 35 to 40 Saskatchewan jobbing extras 70 firsts 65, seconds 45, Edmonton jobbing extras 65, firsts 50, Vancouver jobbing extras 50, firsts 48, seconds 44 to 46.

**MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 10.**—Dominion livestock—the bulk of today's receipts had not arrived when the market opened and cattle sales this morning were confined to common to fair cows at from \$2.00 to \$4.25, and a half dozen common bulls at \$3.00 to \$3.25. Two lots of medium to fair quality calves brought \$9.00 and \$9.50 and a few good ones sold to local butchers at \$10.50.

Hogs of good quality and weight sold in mixed lots from \$11.50. Selects sold yesterday for \$12.40 and sows from \$9.00 to \$9.75 with an extreme top of \$10.00.

Receipts up to ten o'clock were 275 cattle, 35 sheep and lambs, 968 hogs and 313 calves, with a few cars to be unloaded.
