A few weeks ago Mrs. Flood was taken to a Columbus hospital to undergo an operation, dying from the effects. The shock of the news of the death of Mrs. Flood was too great for her (not being in good health) and she was the direct cause of her death. A message was received here early Wednesday morning, says an exchange, announcing her serious illness and her son Glenroy left immediately for that city but his mother had passed to the great beyond before he reached her side. She was about 68 years old and a life long member of the Presbyterian Church. Indeed a noble woman has passed from our midst. She was a kind and indulgent mother, a true Christian and a good neighbor, always ready to lend assistance to those in need. Her husband met his death during the flood of 1898 when he fell through the elevator in his grocery store on Front street. She is survived by three sons and one daughter as follows: Benjamin, Herbert, Glenroy and Martha. Her remains were taken to Pomeroy, Ohio, for burial. (Mrs. Ewing re-married to a daughter of the late George Wadman and her mother was formerly Miss Burns of Freetown, sister of the late Hon. Stewart Burns. One sister Mrs. Muttart of Union Corner, besides a host of relatives are left to mourn her demise.)
