P. E. I. Reaches \$19,000 in Red Cross Drive

The Canadian Red Cross Society has realized \$3,725,000.00 to date in its nationwide campaign for funds. Dr. Fred W. Roulley, National Commissioner, announced today, emphasizing that this was merely a progress report. Dr. Roulley expressed confidence that when complete returns were received, the Society would reach its objective of five million dollars.

"We are four hundred thousand dollars ahead of the amount received in the same period last year," Roulley said. "The province of Alberta does not begin its campaign until October fourteen and the appeals of many towns and cities in some other provinces have been made to meet local conditions."

Ontario leads the other provinces with a total to date of \$1,752,000.00. Quebec is coming in second with \$1,433,000.00. British Columbia reports \$900,000.00 in sight, and the totals for the other provinces so far are:
Nova Scotia—\$159,000.00
New Brunswick—\$55,500.00
Manitoba—\$2,000.00
Saskatchewan—\$60,000.00
Prince Edward Island—\$19,000.00
"We are delighted with the faith shown in the Canadian Red Cross by the people of Canada," Dr. Roulley commented, "and are quite optimistic about the final result of our campaign. We have a huge programme ahead of us and need every cent that everyone can give. While we are grateful for the larger donations given to the Canadian Red Cross, we are especially pleased with the number of small gifts that everyone has given."

TENSION IN

pression to the Italian people that Hitler, virtually stalemated by British resistance in the west, has appealed to Mussolini to take the lead in pressing the war in the near east. Meantime, the incursions of German "model army" forces into Rumania have created new tension in Turkey and the Balkans. British and German war activities seem to be impending in the near east, but neither side has commitments with London.

The fact that Britain has not called upon Turkey to implement her understanding for maintaining the status quo in the Mediterranean looks like evidence that in the opinion of London, the situation in that area has not become serious as yet.

Britain stands pledged to help Greece if attacked, and Turkey to join Britain on (v), with a reservation as to Russia's attitude. It is clear, therefore, that Italian and German war activities seem to be impending in the near east, but neither side has commitments with London.

Increase In Tourist Traffic Is Indicated
It is rather startling to realize that a number of people equivalent to over half of our population came to the shores of Prince Edward Island during the first nine months of 1940.
We have received from Mr. B. Graham Rogers, Supervisor of the Prince Edward Island Travel Bureau, the following figures for the end of September.
For the first nine months of this year 10,372 automobiles came over the Car Ferry to Prince Edward Island, and this is an increase of 346 over the same period last year. The number of passengers brought over on the car ferry from Cape Breton to Borden, during the same period, is 49,242. This figure, of course, includes the passengers who travelled by rail as well as those who travelled by automobile. There is an increase of 4,011 persons over the same period last year. This is quite remarkable in view of the fact that the island throughout the year as a whole, is considered to be less than last year. It does show that the publicity Prince Edward Island is now receiving is bringing results.
The figures for October, November and December, it is hoped, will also show some increase over last year.
A certain number of those travellers were, of course, Islanders, but there are three months of the year not yet included in the end of September total of 49,242 persons. It is reasonable to assume that the number of the year would be equivalent to the number of actual Prince Edward Islanders crossing on the car ferry, and therefore, the total of almost 50,000 people could easily represent for the year the number of non-residents who visited us in 1940.
Various tourist publications have estimated that the average tourist spends at least \$10.00 in a place that he visits, and that this is a reasonable estimate. The general travel industry in this province is therefore worth at least a half million dollars to our people. The money is divided between food, lodging, gas, and other services, and as a consequence everybody benefits.
There are still great possibilities for the future of this industry in Prince Edward Island and it is to be hoped that the energetic program, carried out this year by the Prince Edward Island Travel Bureau, will be continued.

of a whole Nazi division had proved false. As the Germans moved in, British moved out. The last British officials who have been supervising Britain's extensive interests in Rumania had begun leaving the island and the entire British colony of between 300 to 400 is expected to follow shortly.
German agents meanwhile began buying up every available bushel of grain in Rumania to provision Nazi troops whose mission is to transform Rumania's armed forces into a bulwark against any aggression.
Rumania centered her relations with the Axis powers by banning oil shipments to pro-British Greece, but modified its order later upon representations by the Greek minister to permit all contracts approved up to Oct. 5 to be filled.
A German ban on oil shipments to other countries not friendly to Germany is expected to follow. This would fall hardest on Turkey.

Goldwell Criticizes Hanson's Remarks

REGINA, Oct. 9.—(CP)—M. J. Colewell, Conservative Member of Parliament, criticized remarks made by Conservative Leader R. B. Hanson in an address at Fredericton yesterday.
Mr. Hanson in his address said the Congress of Industrial Organizations had "used the name of the Canadian Congress of Labor and would endeavor to yoke up with the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation in a bid for power in Canada in the next election."
Mr. Colewell, acting leader of the C.C.P. during the illness of James S. Woodworth, when reached at his home constituency today, said:
"The Canadian Congress of Labor is an organization consisting of a number of labor organizations in Canada and has no affiliation with the C.C.F. or any other party. One of the organizations associated with the C.C.F. is the United Mine Workers of Nova Scotia. That organization has been affiliated with the C.C.F. for two years."
"The C.C.P. with a program almost identical with that of the British Labor Party and the New Zealand Labor Party, will endeavor to build itself through farmer and labor organizations to wrest the control of Canada by Democratic means from the big financial and industrial interests."
"If he characterizes the C.C.F. as red, then the dynamic leaders of the British government are of the same color."

VICHY, France, Oct. 9.—(AP)—The Petain-Laval government decided today on severe censorship of foreign motion pictures whether produced in France or for export to "avoid any demoralizing influence on French youth," and to show foreign audiences "the true aspect of France."
