Hammer At Nazi Lines Of Communication

LONDON, April 28 (CP)—British bombers hammered Nazi communications and supply lines in Holland and northern France today and damaged two enemy mine-sweepers in an assault on a small convoy off the coast of Brittany, the Air Ministry announced tonight.
Possibly indicating another R.A.F. sweep over Germany, the British made was silent tonight for 50 minutes starting at 10.30 p.m.
Fighters on offensive patrolled damaged several barges and locomotives in Holland and fighter bombers struck at a number of railway targets in northern France. Whirlwind bombers attacked the convoy.
Three aircraft are missing from the day's operations.
These assaults followed a torpedo attack by Canadian Beaufighters on a medium-sized Nazi merchant ship and its escort off the Norwegian coast yesterday.
At least three torpedoes—one of them fired by FO. R. H. Scholtes of Fort William, Ont., were seen to strike the ship which was left listing steeply.
The Beaufighters and their escort of lighter fighters heavily machine-gunned the merchantman's escort of anti-aircraft ships.
Scholes reported heavy steam was issuing from the vessel even before his own torpedo struck it.

Gives Figures On U. S. Production

NEW YORK, April 28 (AP)—Production lines of the United States this war year will turn out nearly 100,500 airplanes and almost 19,000,000 deadweight tons of dry cargo vessels and tankers, business leaders were told today.
Vice chairman William L. Batt of the war production board, speaking before the annual convention of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, gave the figures on plane production, adding that this meant an increase of approximately 50,000 planes over 1942.
Rear Admiral Emory S. Land, chairman of the United States Maritime Commission, told the gathering that the ship production of almost 19,000,000 tons in American yards in 1943 compares with more than 8,000,000 tons built in 1942.

Is Critical Of Conference

ALBANY, N.Y., April 28 (AP)—The Anglo-American conference in Bermuda seeking a solution to the European refugee problem was criticized tonight by the president of the Synagogue Council of America as "not only a failure but a mockery."
Rabbi Israel Goldstein, New York City, in an address at a "stop-Hitler" rally sponsored by the American Jewish Congress, declared "victims are not being rescued because the democracies do not want them." He continued:
"The job of the Bermuda conference apparently was not to rescue victims of Nazi terror, but to rescue our state department and the British foreign office from possible embarrassment."
"It is a sad commentary upon the disparity between our professed war aims, which speak in terms of humanitarianism, and our actions, which are motivated by timidity and by catering to the forces of reaction in our midst."

SUMMER TRANSPORTATION

The Wood Islands-Caribou ferry service will begin operations for the season Saturday morning, May 1st. Schedule for May and June—Leaves Wood Islands 7.00 a.m. and 2.30 p.m. and leaves Caribou 9.00 a.m. and 4.30 p.m. There will be three daily trips during July, August and September.

An announcement will be made Friday morning in regard to date bus service will start from Charlottetown to Montague, Murray River, Murray Harbour and Wood Islands. The buses are ready and it depends on the roads.

Beginning early in May all other bus services will be in operation throughout the Province on practically the same schedules as last year. The Island Motor Transport will have improved equipment, including several modern Aerocoaches. Exact date of starting operations will be announced as soon as possible.

AIR SERVICE TO MAINLAND. Effective Saturday, May 1st. Trip No. 1, Maritime Central Airways, will leave Charlottetown 7.50 a.m., leave Summerside 8.25 a.m., arrive Moncton 9.00 a.m. All other air service schedules same as at present.

RAIL SERVICE. Double daily, except Sunday, train service to and from the Mainland begins Monday, May 24th. New schedules have been arranged whereby passengers from East of Charlottetown and West of Summerside will connect with the 1.00 p.m. trip of the ferry at Borden and make connections at Sackville for Halifax and Montreal. Watch for detailed announcement as it will provide a greatly improved service. For Sunday connection to and from the Mainland, there will be a bus service on which railway tickets will be honoured. This and other arrangements are particularly advantageous to members of the Armed Forces on leave as well as civilians.

A special transportation circular is now being prepared, which will give complete details of all the improved summer services, and in addition newspaper announcements will be made. These improvements, to be announced later in detail, have been secured through extensive negotiations with the various transportation officials and your Travel Bureau, and every consideration was extended to you by railway, bus and air officials and the Transit Controller, in so far as present war conditions permit.

Men Born From 1902 to 1924 Must Prove Compliance With Mobilization Regulations When Asking Permits to Seek Employment

By order of the Minister of Labour issued pursuant to National Selective Service Civilian Regulations, (P.C. 246, January 19, 1943) an important change is now made in regard to the issue by Employment and Selective Service Offices, of permits to seek employment.
After April 30, 1943, a permit to seek employment may be refused to any male person born in any of the years from 1902 to 1924, inclusive, who has reached age 19, unless such person presents satisfactory evidence that he has not contravened the provisions of National Selective Service Mobilization Regulations (that is, Military Call-Up Regulations). Evidence required is to be in one of the following forms:
(a) a certificate of discharge from His Majesty's Forces after service during the present war; or
(b) a rejection slip issued by the Army on application for enlistment; or
(c) a certificate of medical examination issued by the Registrar of a Mobilization Board; or
(d) a postponement order certificate issued by the Registrar of a Mobilization Board; or
(e) in the case of a male person born in any of the years from 1902 to 1916 inclusive, a statutory declaration on a form available in the employment office, that he is not a "single person" under Mobilization Regulations.
Documents referred to in (a), (b) and (c) above need be presented only the first time a permit is sought after April 30, 1943, unless subsequently asked for by a Selective Service Office. Documents referred to in (c) and (d) above must be presented each time a permit is applied for.
Two points under the new Regulations are to be specially noted:
(1) Male persons applying for permits by mail should forward with their applications the evidence required (except (c) above).
(2) A Selective Service Officer MAY furnish a permit without first being handed evidence, where the applicant's services are required for immediate employment, or where a permit is asked for by mail, but in these cases the evidence must be presented to the Selective Service Officer later, usually WITHIN THREE DAYS of the issue of the permit.

All men, born from 1902 to 1924, who have reached age 19, are urged to co-operate with Employment and Selective Service Officers in this matter. Help yourselves, help others applying for permits, help the Offices to function smoothly, by having your documents with you when needed.
