BUSH TELEGRAPH DEFECTIVE

BULAWAYO, Southern Rhodesia, Oct. 11—(CP)—The African "bush telegraph"—through which natives are reputed to transmit messages over great distances by means of "talking drums"—isn't nearly as effective as some explorers have reported, language expert Hugh Tracey said here. Following a tour of Northern Rhodesia and the Congo, Tracey told reporters that only simple messages could be transmitted by the drums, and dialect differences make it almost impossible for the message to travel any great distance.
