Recalling Words Deeds and Humor of 'John A's' Day

OTTAWA, May 30 (CP)—One of the leading figures in the negotiation of the Confederation of the provinces of Canada in 1867 and first prime minister of the Dominion, Sir John A. Macdonald was a dominating personality in Canadian politics for 24 years before his death in Ottawa, June 6, 1891, at the age of 76.

Sheer's About Turn

He said: "Under the broad folds of the Union Jack we enjoy the most ample liberty to govern ourselves as we please and at the same time we participate in the advantages which flow from association with the mightiest empire the world has ever seen."
