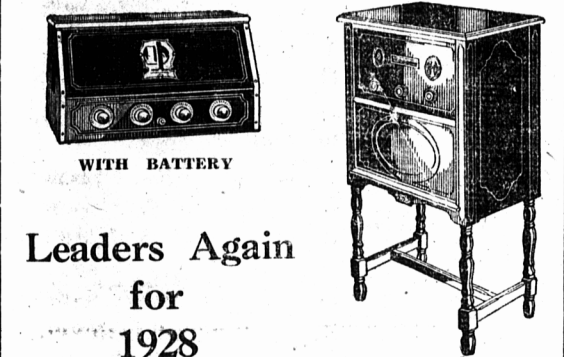

One Killed And Six Crash In Auto Race

SALEM, N. H., October 15.—Fred Jomer, veteran auto racer of Los Angeles, was fatally injured today during the Rockingham Speedway 100-mile race when his car skidded while rounding a turn. Comer, driver of the car, was taken to hospital in Lawrence, Mass., where he died.

Four cars figured in a crash a short time after Comer was hurt. Jimmy Gleason of Boston, was thrown from his car when it skidded near the grandstand. Ray Keech, following close behind, ran over Gleason as he lay on the track and crashed into Gleason's car. Lou Moore and Bob McDonough then crashed into the two wrecked cars. Gleason was found to be badly injured and was taken to a Lawrence Hospital. Keech and Moore escaped injuries, while McDonough received several cuts on his head.

Dave Evans was the sixth driver to crash, his car skidding into the pits and throwing him out. He received two broken ribs. He attempted to walk to his pit but collapsed after he had taken a few steps.

Cliff Woodbury was leading when the race was stopped at the 11th lap. Billy Arnold was second and Ralph Hepburn third.

After a conference among the officials the race was postponed until October 27.

A PERFECT FOOD

Any man or woman who swallows watered milk shall have a funnel thrust into his or her mouth, and be compelled to drink so much watered milk as in the judgement of the surgeon can be borne without danger to life.

"Or, any man or woman who sells butter mixed with bets, stones, or other objects, with the object of increasing the weight, shall be arrested and put in the pillory. The butter shall be placed upon his or her head and there remain until it shall have been melted by the heat of the sun. The dogs shall be allowed to lick them and the people scold them with any words it pleases them, provided that neither God, the King, nor any persons be thereby libelled. If the weather is cold, a fire shall be built in front of the rulty one.

This was the situation in Germany in 1481.

No person shall sell, supply or send to ... milk diluted with water, etc., etc.

Any person, firm or corporation who violates, etc., shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty dollars and not less than ten, etc., and in default of payment shall be liable to imprisonment, with or without hard labor, for a term not exceeding six months ... The Dairy Industry Act.
