ATHENS HEARS REPORT OF REBELLION IN TURKEY.

Anglo-French War Council Meets in Paris

PARIS, November 18.—The first meeting of the Joint Anglo-French war council was held here this afternoon. Those taking part were Premier Asquith, A. J. Balfour, First Lord of the Admiralty; David Lloyd George, Minister of Munitions, and Sir Edward Grey, Secretary of Foreign Affairs, of the British Cabinet, while the French participants were Premier Briand, General Gallieni, Minister of War; Admiral Lacaze, Minister of Marine, and General Joffre, the French Commander-in-Chief. The four British ministers arriving in Paris were met by Premier Briand and were given luncheon and a reception in their honour before the French Commander-in-Chief. The Paris meeting of the Anglo-French allied war council of which the Premier spoke in the House of Commons on November 10.

The developments on the Balkan Peninsula perhaps hastened the meeting in Paris of the allied war council as the outcome of the present situation, which from the entente alliance viewpoint, is disquieting, may weigh heavily with the Greek Government in deciding on Greece's final attitude.

The quartette of British statesmen for the war council recently appointed by Premier Asquith, with Sir Edward Grey taking the place of Anson, the Secretary for the Colonies, on it. Mr. Law, with Reginald McKenna, Chancellor of the Exchequer, the fifth member of the war council will be in charge of the House of Commons during Premier Asquith's absence.

ANADIAN LOAN BEFORE PUBLIC IN WEEK'S TIME

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.—It was official y announced today that the advertisements of the new Dominion loan will appear on Monday, Nov. 22. Subscriptions for the loan will be opened on the same day together this is not officially announced. The advertising will continue for a week or ten days and is expected the subscription lists will close on Nov. 30.

The amount of the issue, rate of interest and terms are being closely guarded and will not be announced until the prospectus is issued. It is taken for granted that the amount will be fifty million dollars. In view of the high rate of interest on the Anglo-French Commission for their half billion it is not thought likely the rate can be less; it may be slightly higher.

Hon. W. T. White is anxious that the loan should be a popular one and that the subscriptions should be as numerous as possible. For that reason bonds will be issued in one hundred, five hundred and thousand dollar lots. Payments will likely be spread over a certain time.

The staff of the Finance Department is busily engaged in arranging for the handling of the issue. Promises of hearty co-operation have been received from banks, financial institutions and the public generally so that the outlook is that the issue will be a success.
